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Introduction

This report aims to make accessible Statistics Canada’s 2016 census data on housing and demographics for the city of Montréal and its boroughs. This material may be used, reproduced and published with proper attribution. If you spot a mistake, please let us know. We are dedicated to providing reliable and transparent data.

The data is presented in tables as counts and percentages based on relevant totals. The relevant universe for each table or graph is specified in the source notes. Chosen information is displayed in graph or map form to facilitate comparisons and illustrate tendencies.

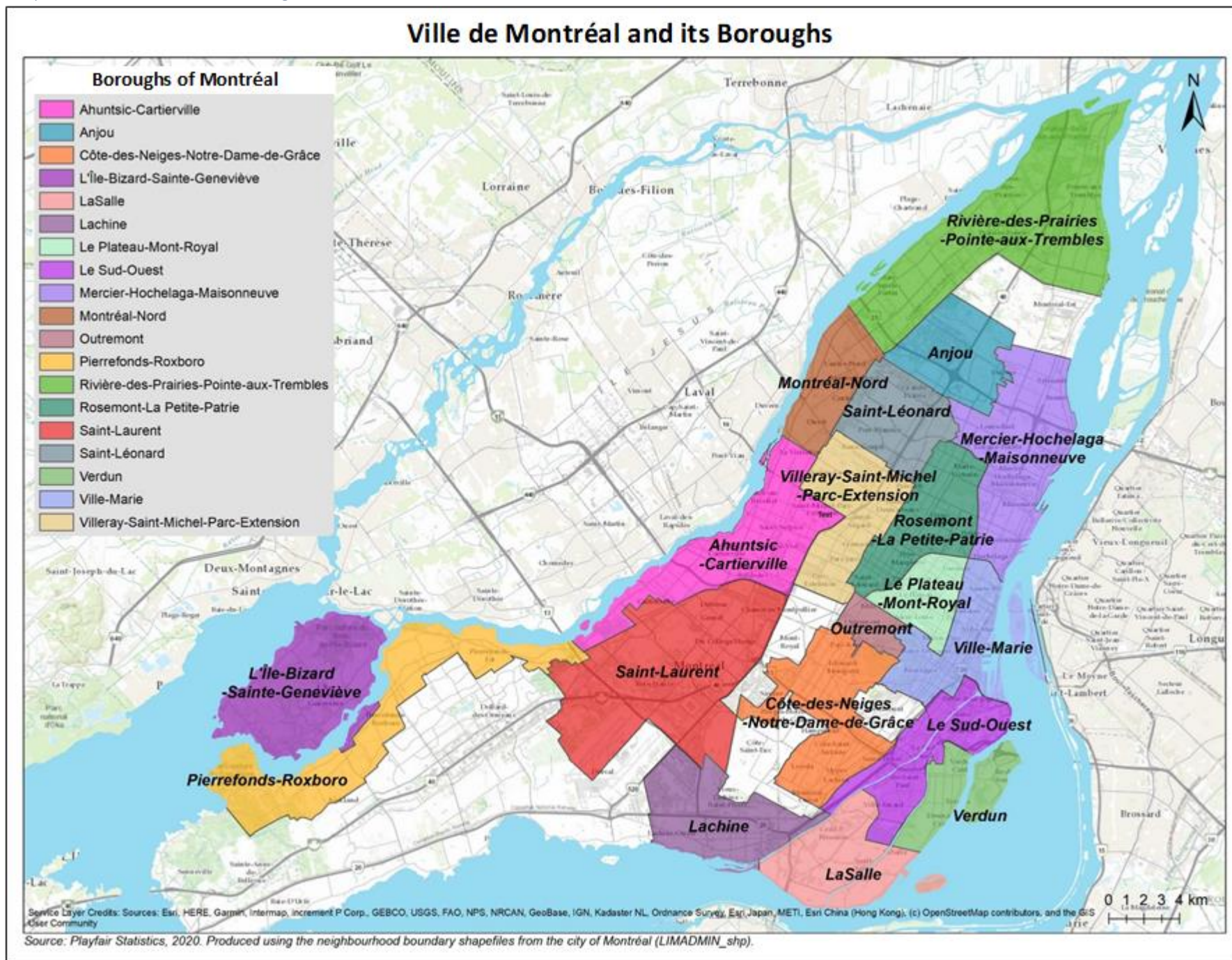
This report has been divided into four major sections. The first section presents information about private dwellings including type, size, and tenure. The second section focuses on the makeup of private households, including family structure and composition. The third displays language characteristics for each borough. The fourth major section focuses on socio-economic characteristics including household income, shelter costs and commuting. The methodology used to derive boroughs from Census Tracts is included to allow for verification and reproduction. A glossary follows at the end to help readers accurately understand specific Census terminology and concepts.

The geographies chosen for study are the boroughs of Montréal, therefore excluding the island’s independent towns or cities. The focus is on comparing these boroughs with each other and placing them in the wider context of the city. Montréal’s boroughs, or “arrondissements”, are the municipal subdivisions listed as follows: Ahuntsic-Cartierville, Anjou, Côte-des-Neiges - Notre-Dame-de-Grâce, Lachine, LaSalle, Le Plateau-Mont-Royal, Le Sud-Ouest, L’Île-Bizard–Sainte-Geneviève, Mercier–Hochelaga-Maisonneuve, Montréal-Nord, Outremont, Pierrefonds-Roxboro, Rivière-des-Prairies–Pointe-aux-Trembles, Rosemont–La Petite-Patrie, Saint-Laurent, Saint-Léonard, Verdun, Ville-Marie and Villeray–Saint-Michel–Parc-Extension. Notes

Rounding and Data Suppression: According to Statistics Canada, *“To ensure confidentiality, the values, including totals, are randomly rounded either up or down to a multiple of '5' or '10.' To understand these data, you must be aware that each individual value is rounded. As a result, when these data are summed or grouped, the total value may not match the individual values since totals and sub-totals are independently rounded. Similarly, percentages, which are calculated on rounded data, may not necessarily add up to 100%.”* For related reasons, percentages based on values lower than 25 have been suppressed to ensure reliability.

1 - Private Dwellings

There were 1,684,323 people living in Montréal, housed in 837,063 private dwellings in 2016. A private dwelling is defined by Statistics Canada as "a separate set of living quarters with a private entrance either from outside the building or from a common hall, lobby, vestibule or stairway inside the building. The entrance to the dwelling must be one that can be used without passing through the living quarters of some other person or group of persons." This section shows the number of private dwellings in Montréal and its boroughs, their tenure status, size, condition, and period of construction.

Figure 1.1.1 Population Density

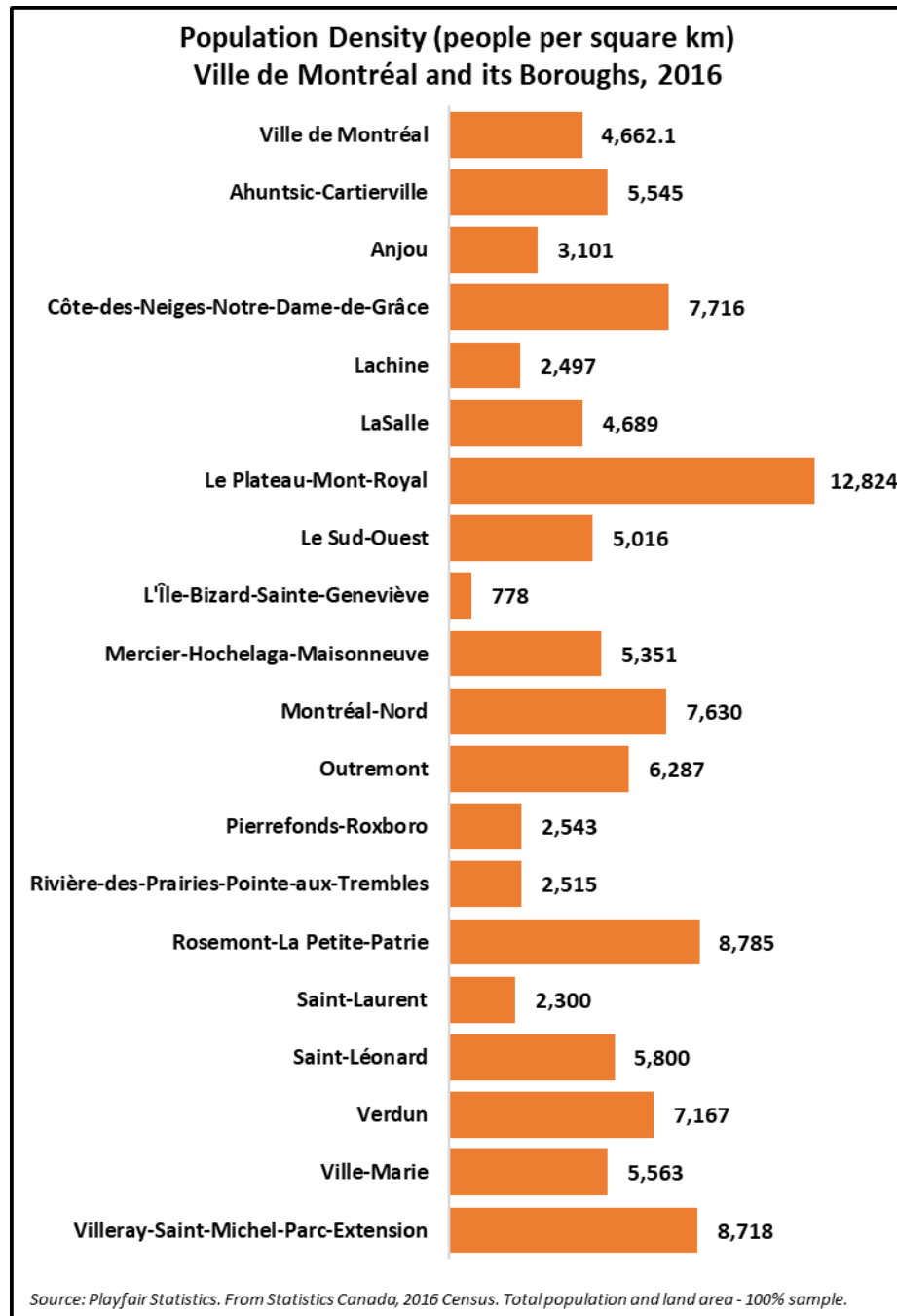
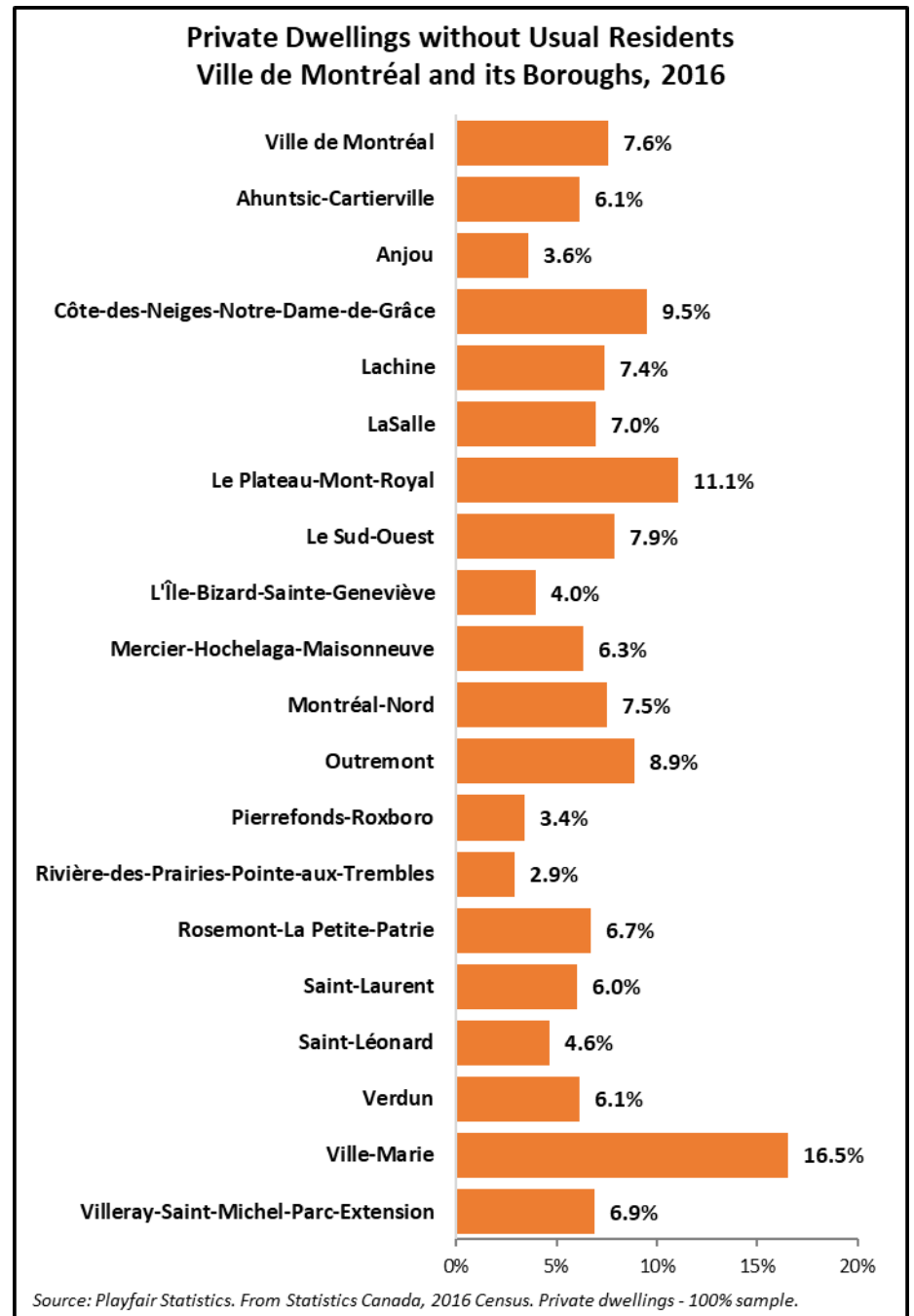


Figure 1.1.2 Dwellings Without Usual Residents

Figure 1.2.1 Single-detached Houses

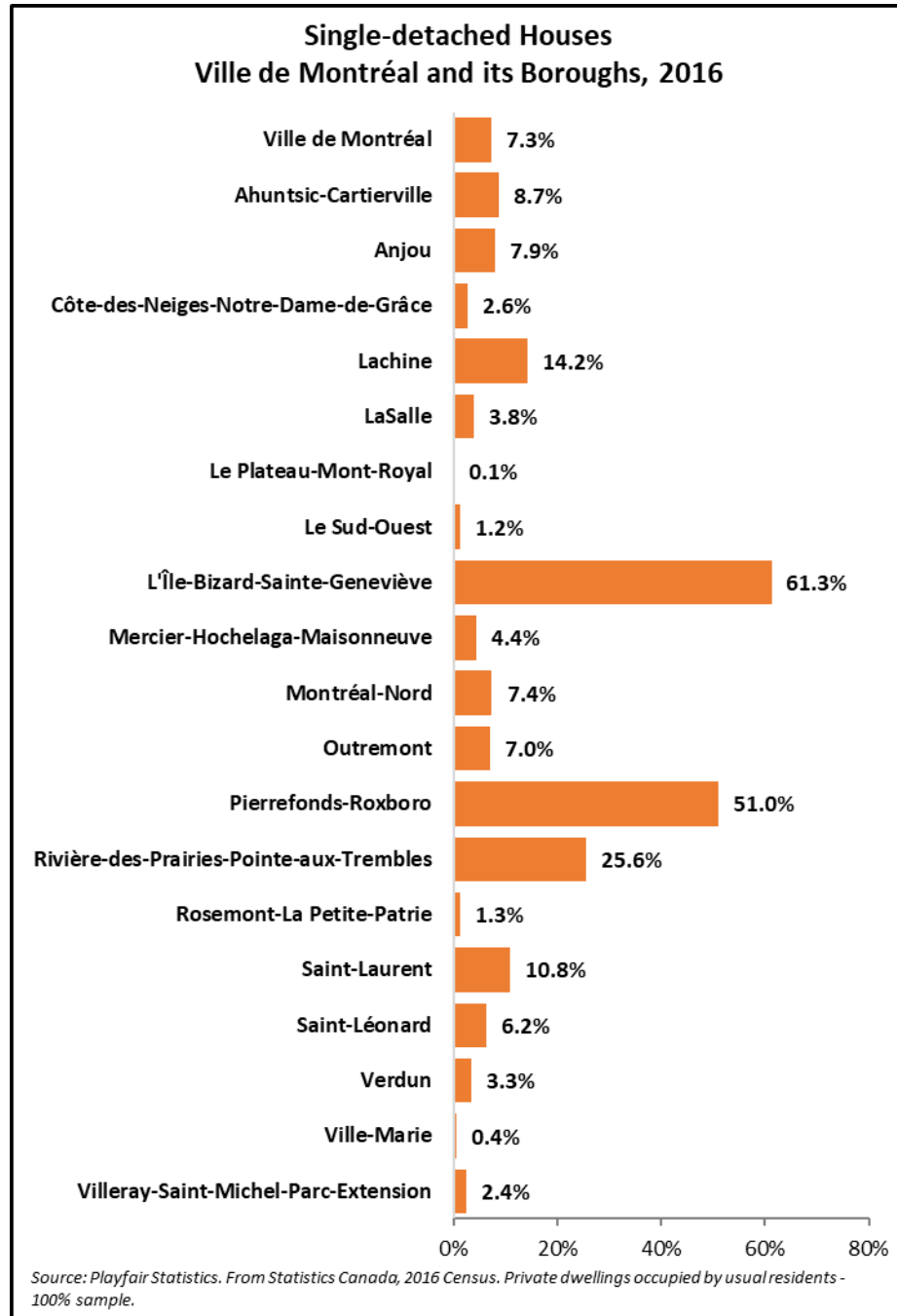
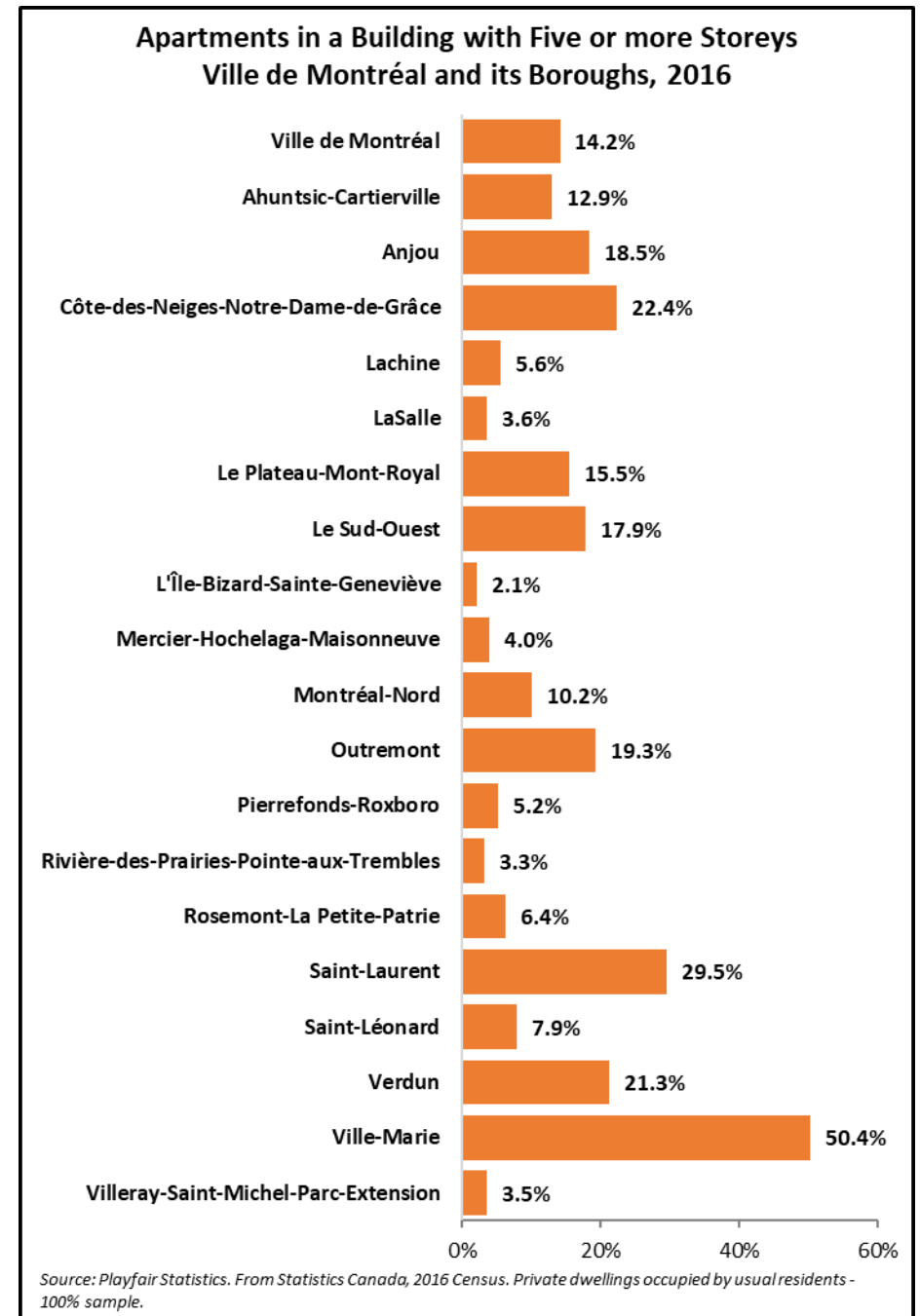


Figure 1.2.2 Apartments in a Building with Five or more Storeys

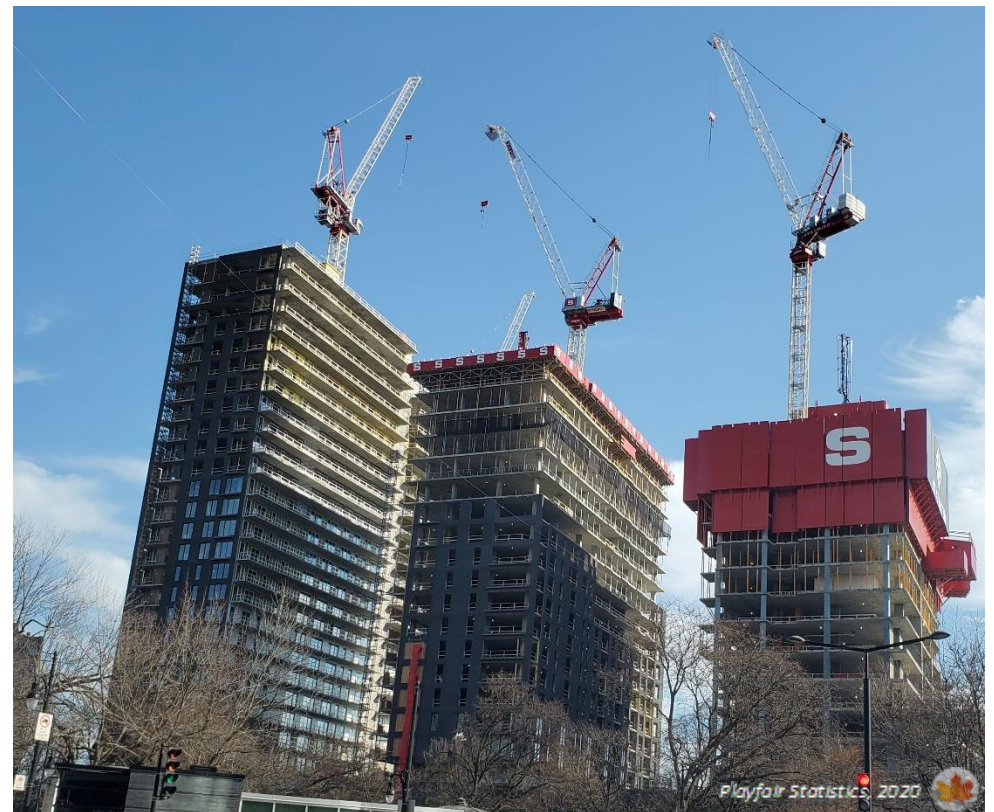
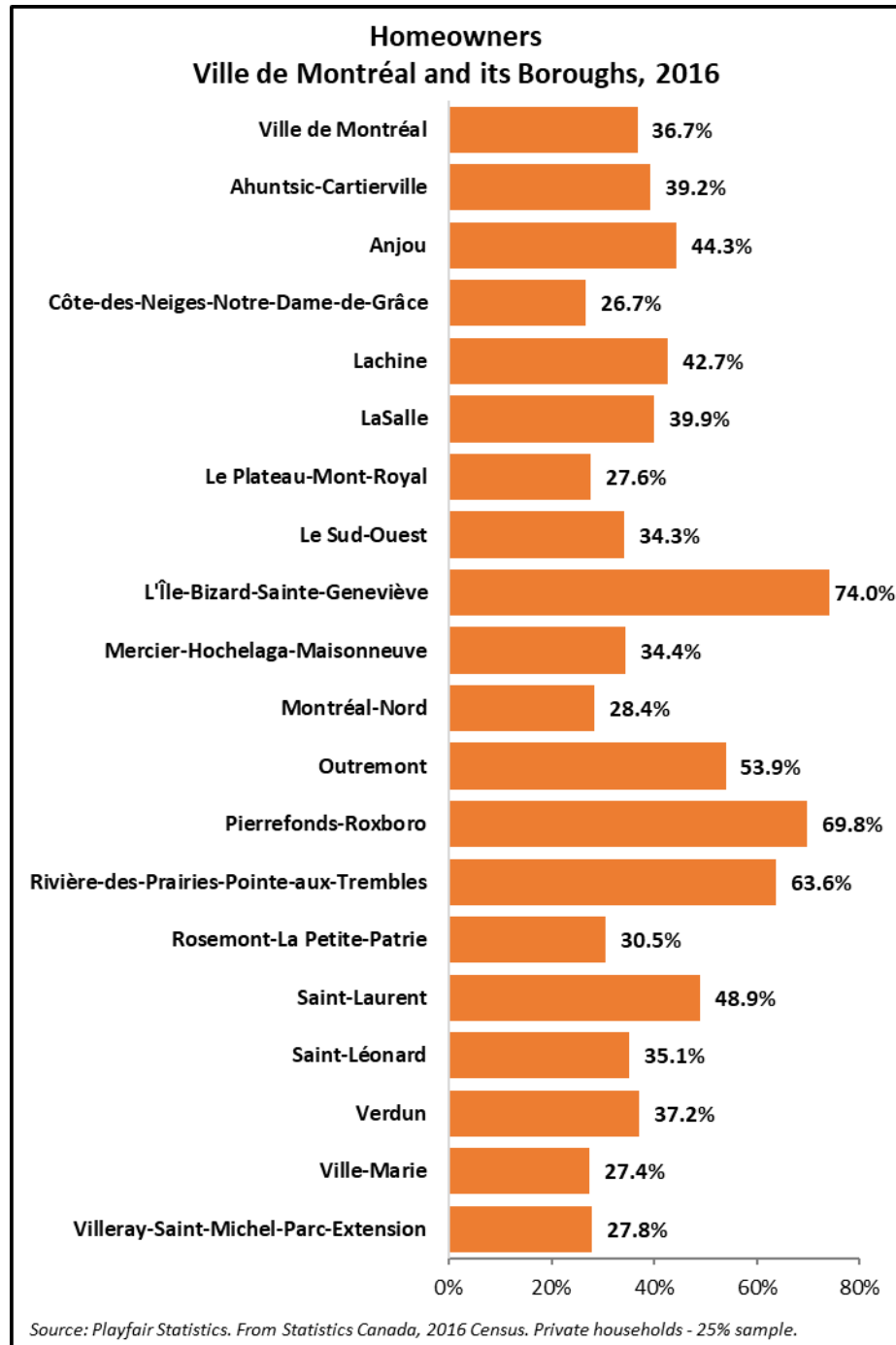

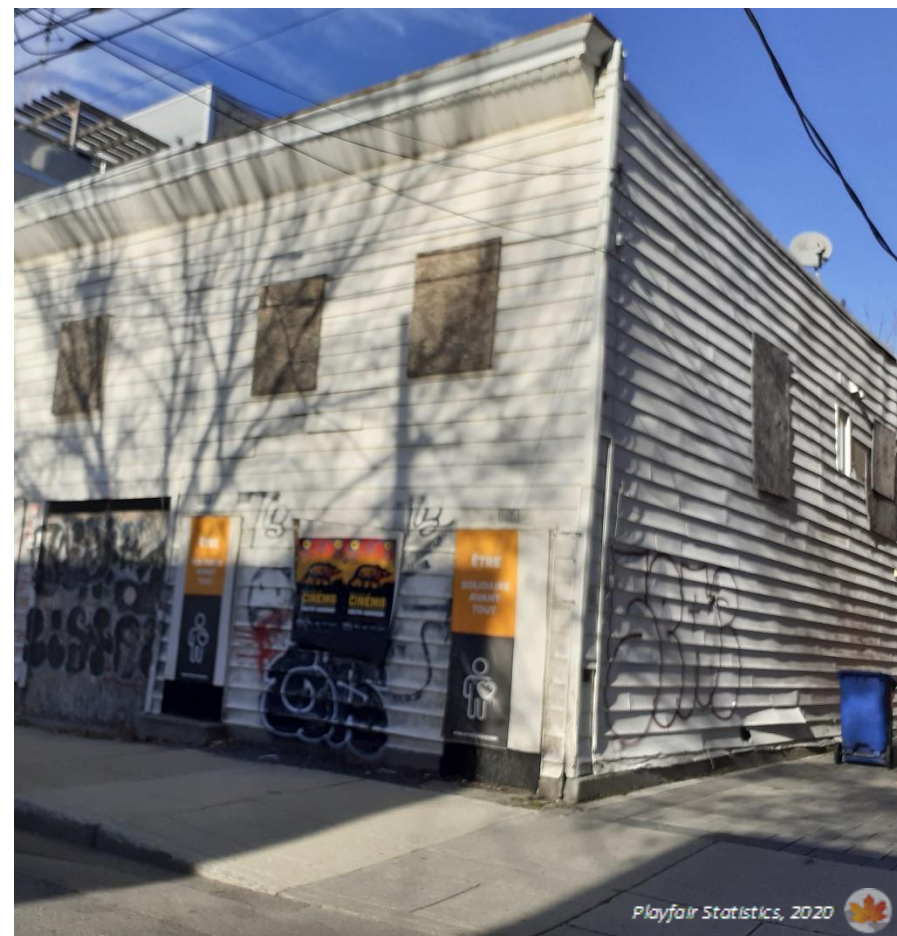
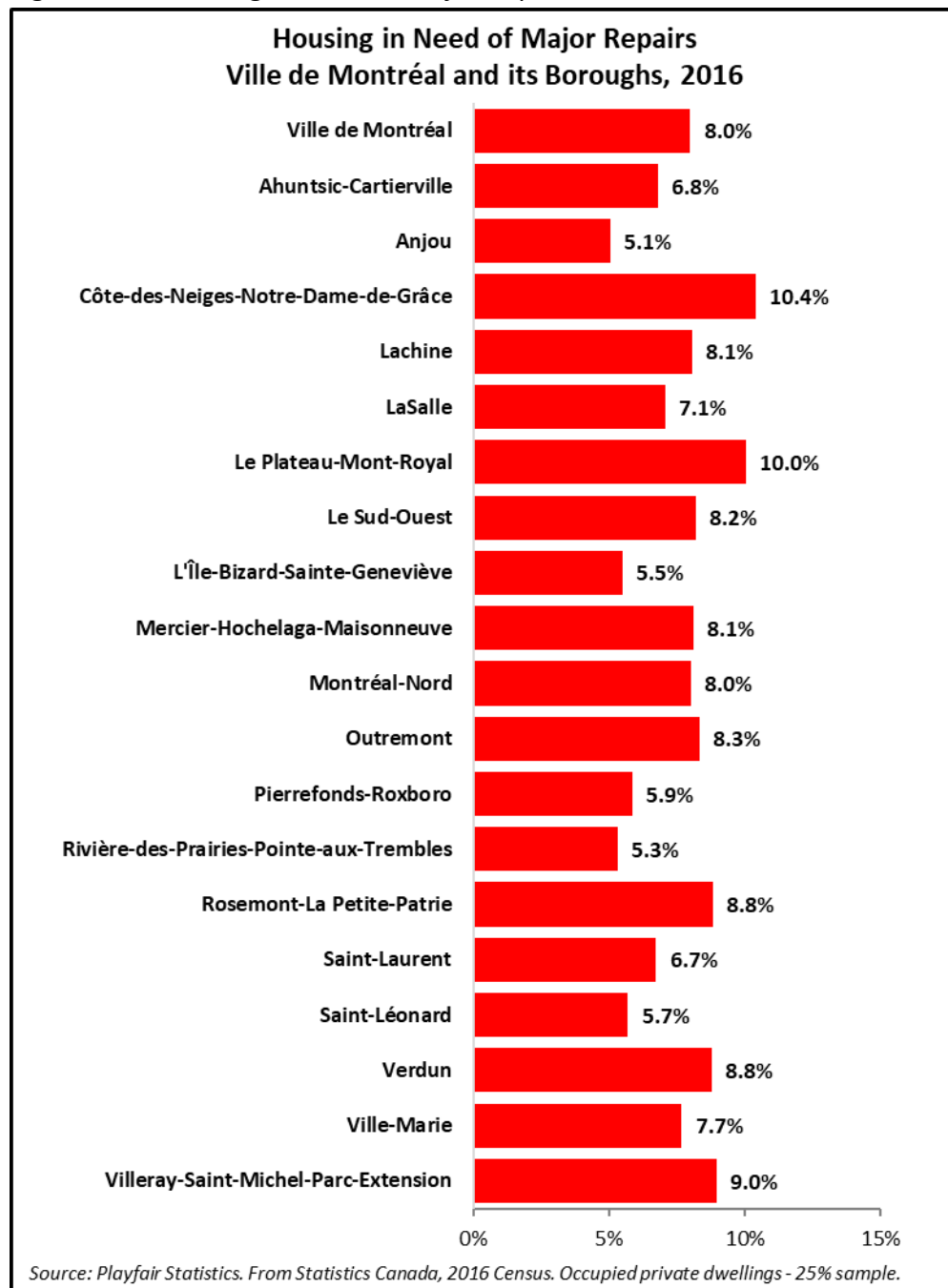

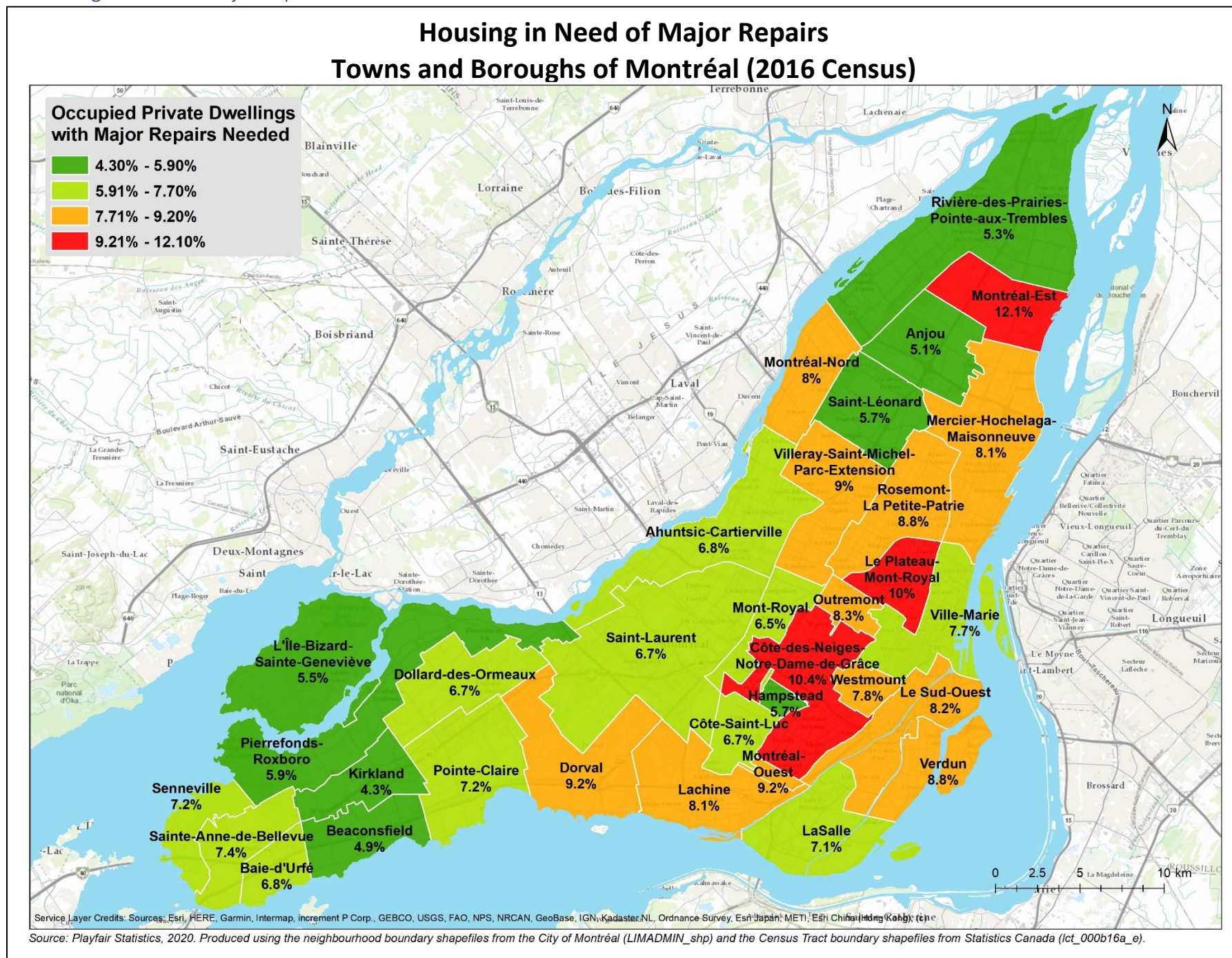

2 - Characteristics of Private Households

A private household is defined by Statistics Canada as "a person or group of persons who occupy the same dwelling and do not have a usual place of residence elsewhere in Canada or abroad. The household universe is divided into two sub-universes on the basis of whether the household is occupying a collective dwelling or a private dwelling. The latter is a private household." There were 773,005 private households in Montréal in 2016. The following section details the distribution of these private households by their size, structure, and type.

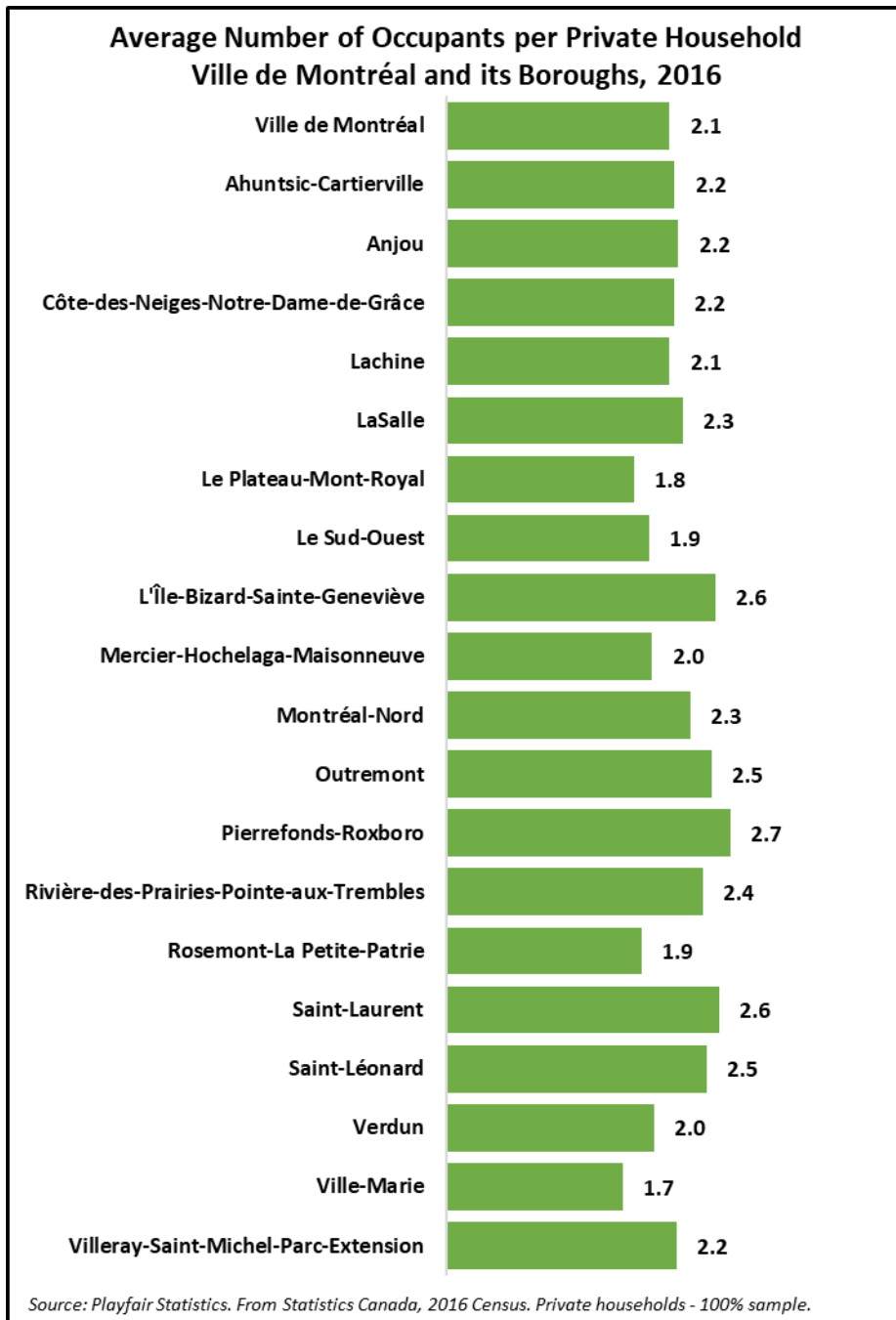

Figure 2.2.1 Lone Parent Families

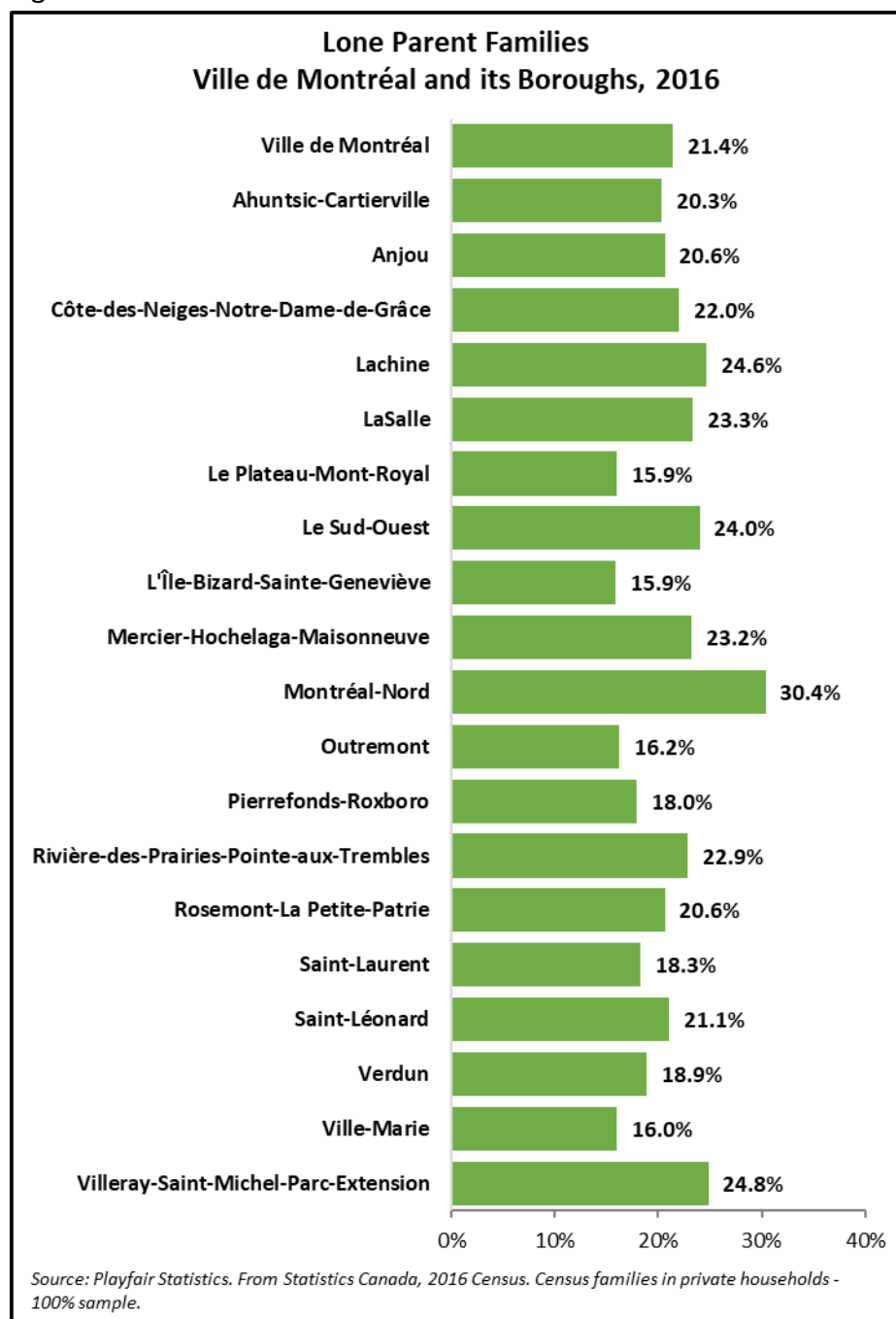
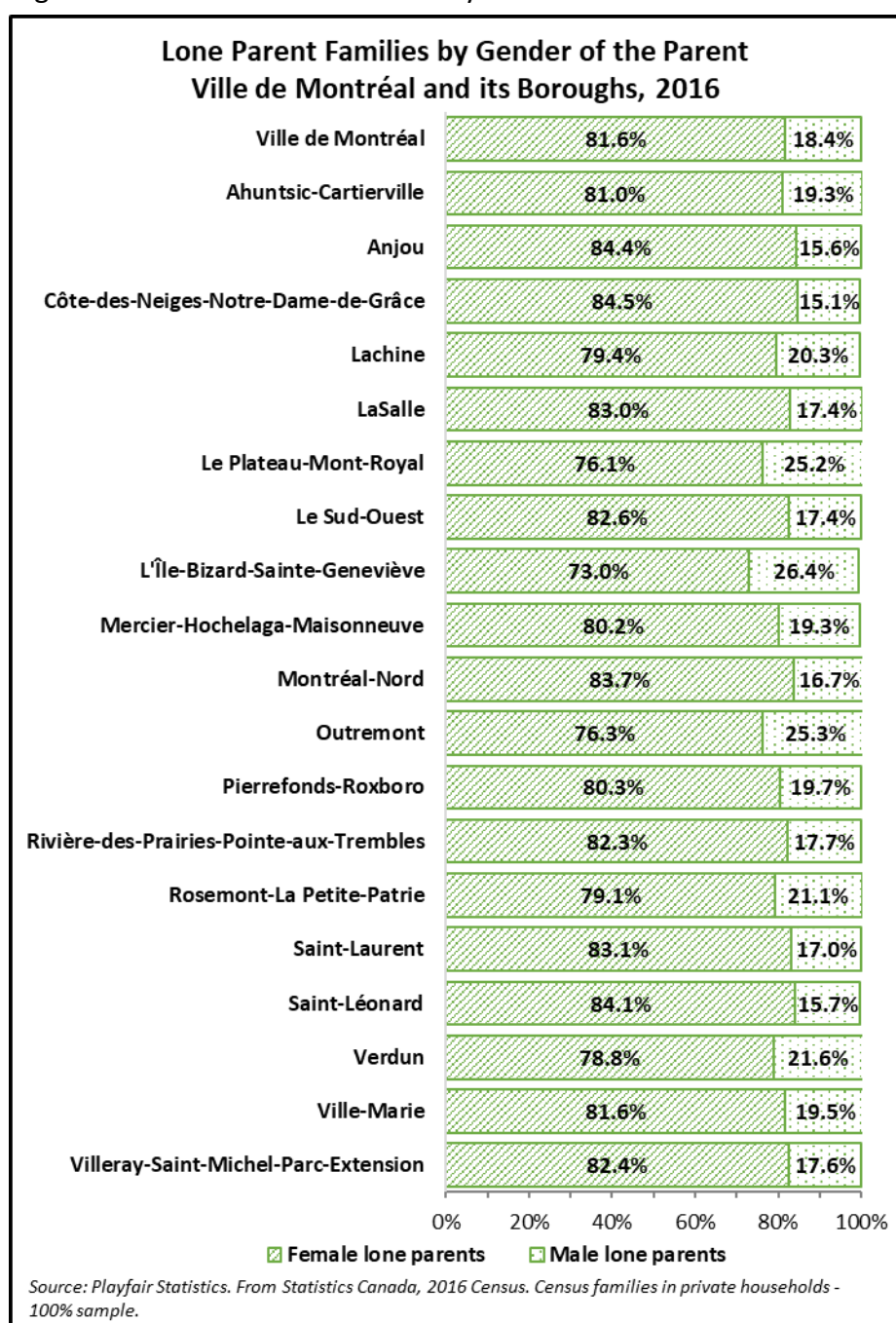


Figure 2.2.2: Lone Parent Families by Gender of the Parent

Figure 3.1.1 Population Who Spoke Only English

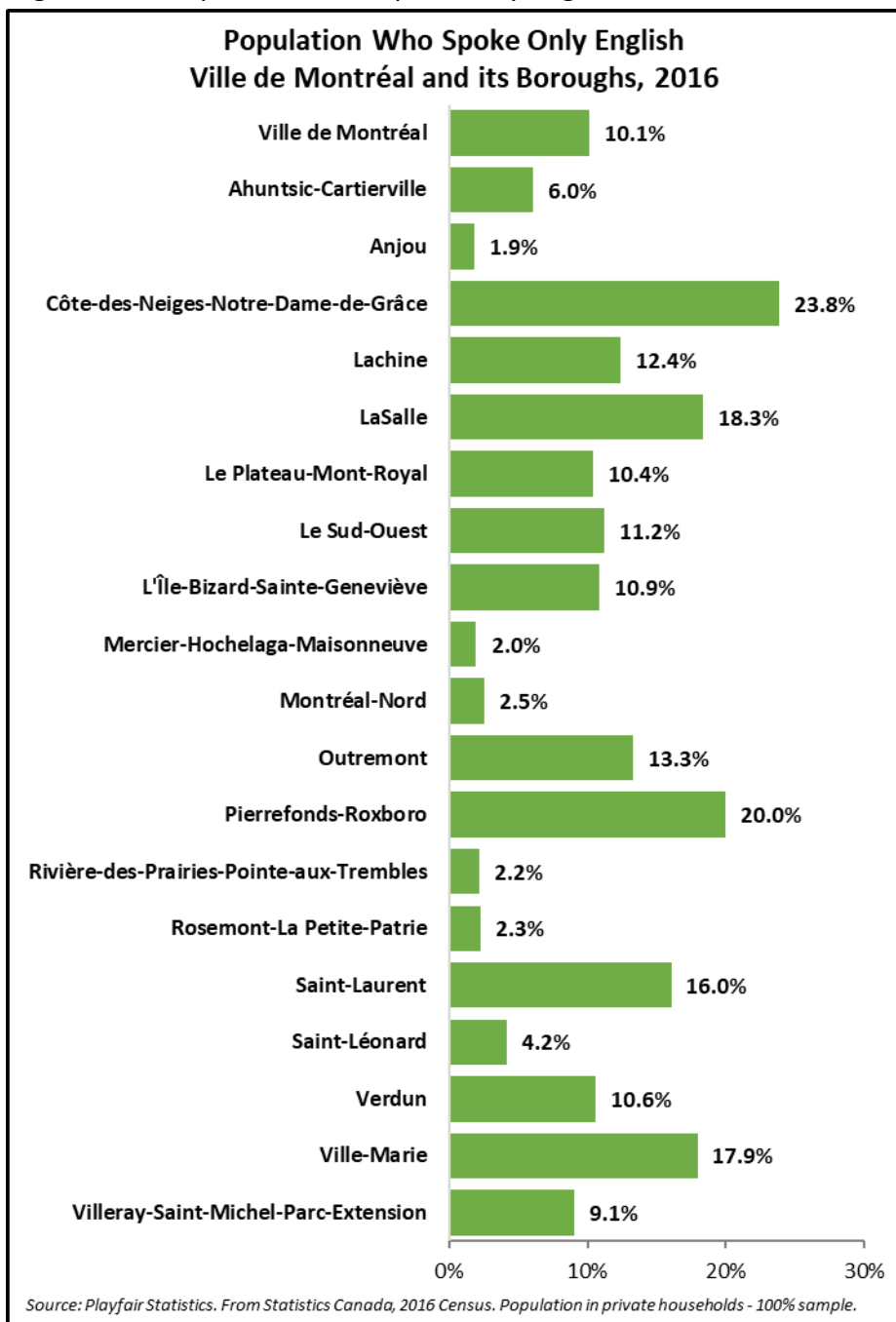
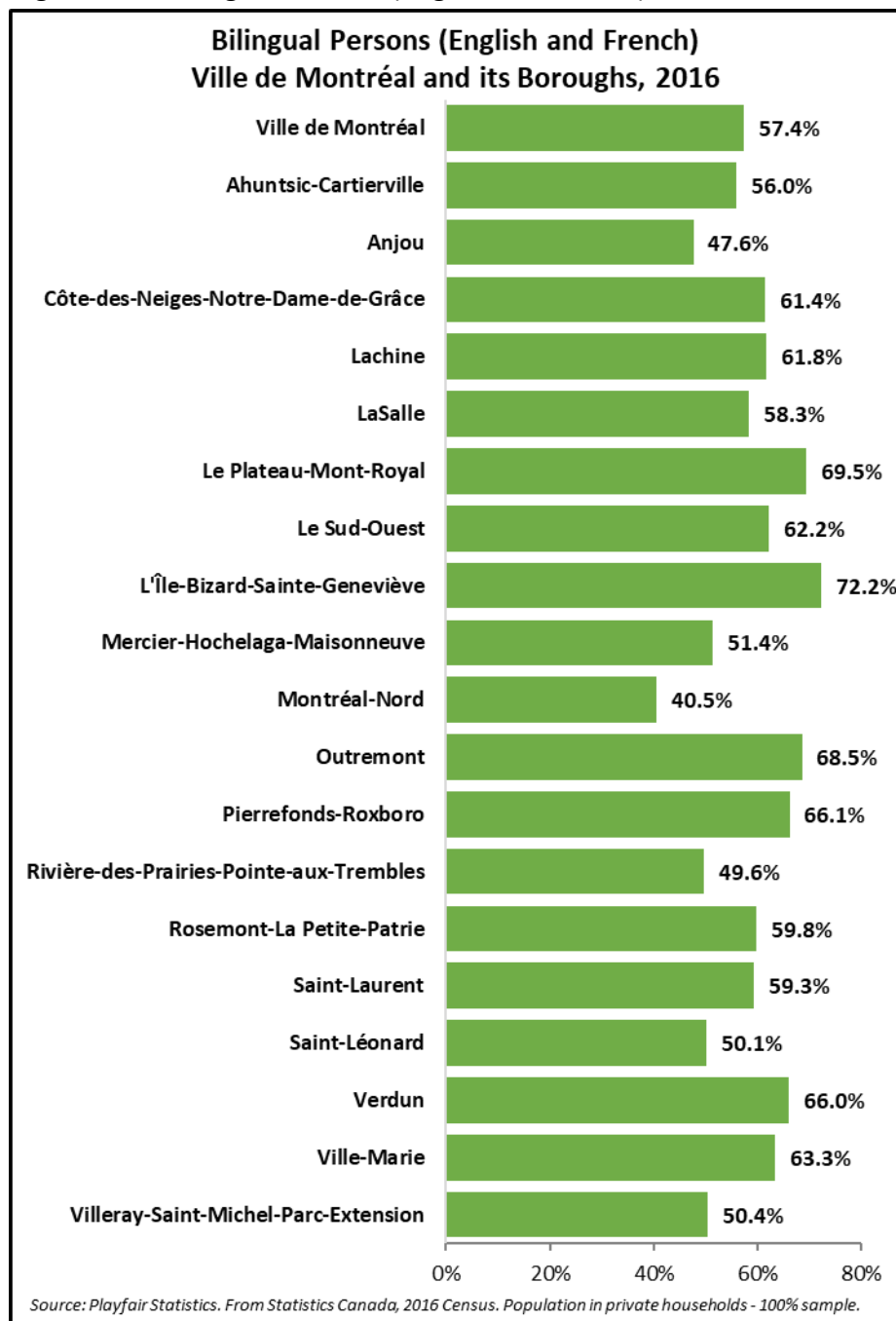


Figure 3.1.2 Bilingual Persons (English and French)



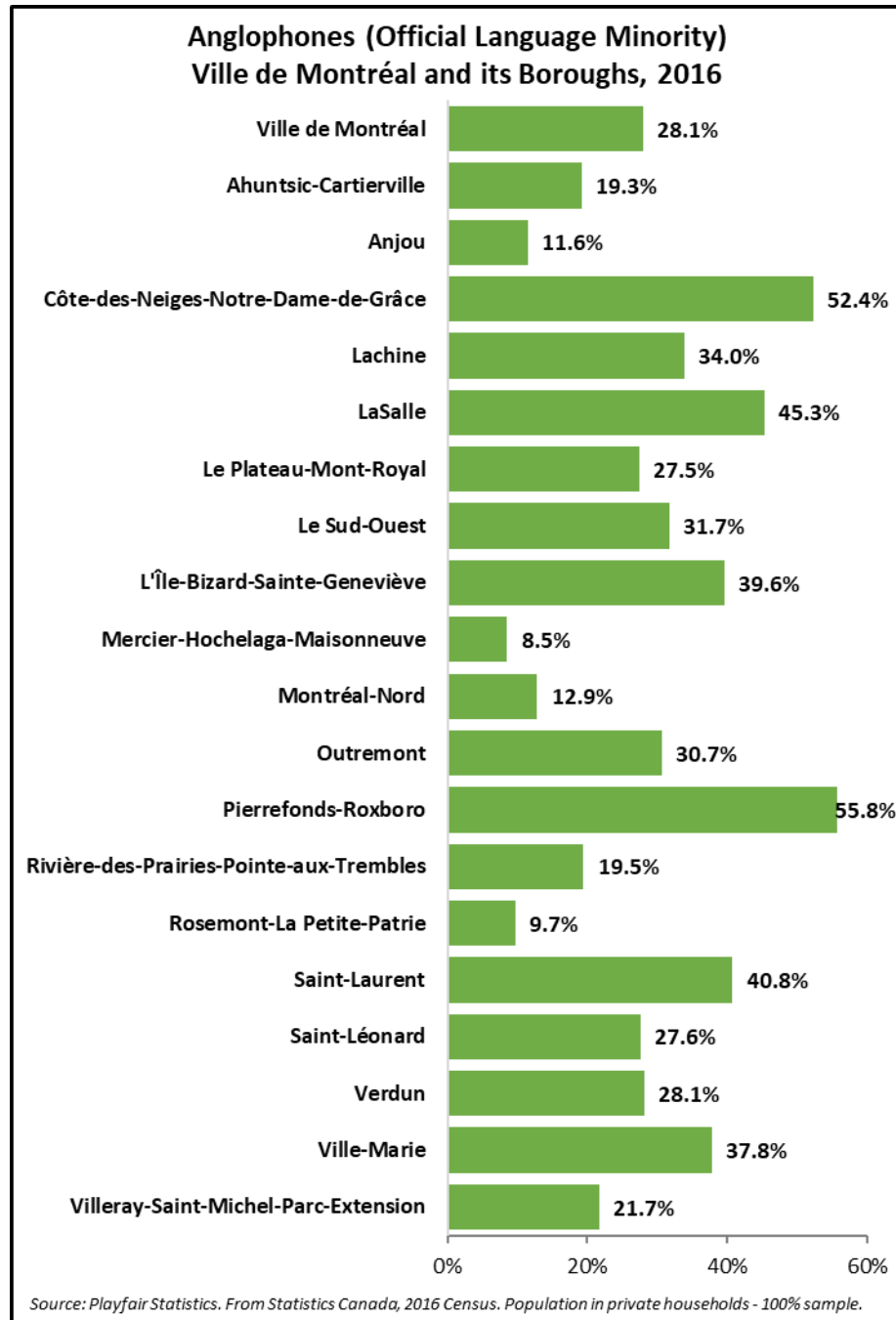

Figure 4.2.1 Average After-tax Income of Households in 2015

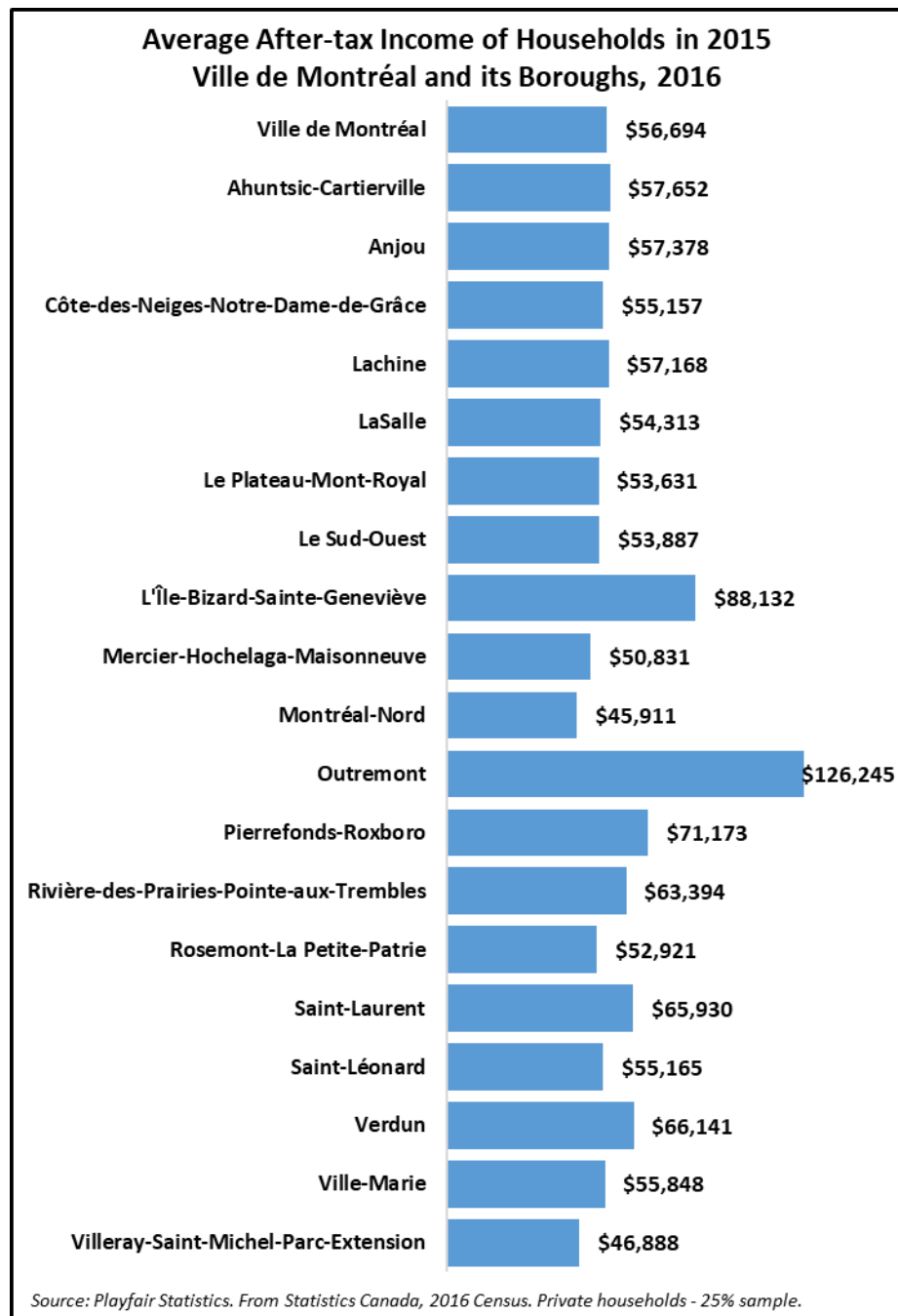


Figure 4.2.2 Average After-tax Income of One-person Households in 2015

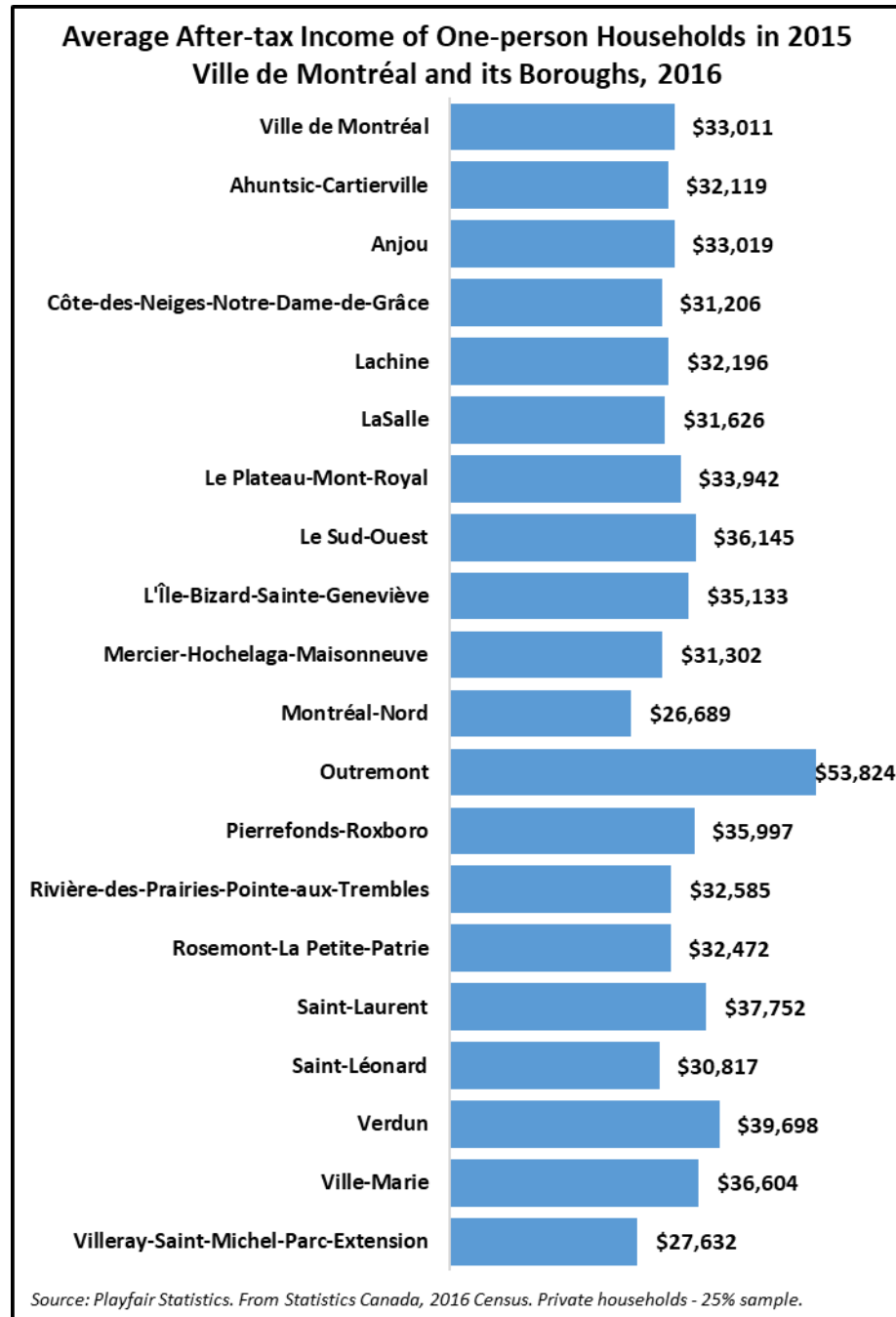
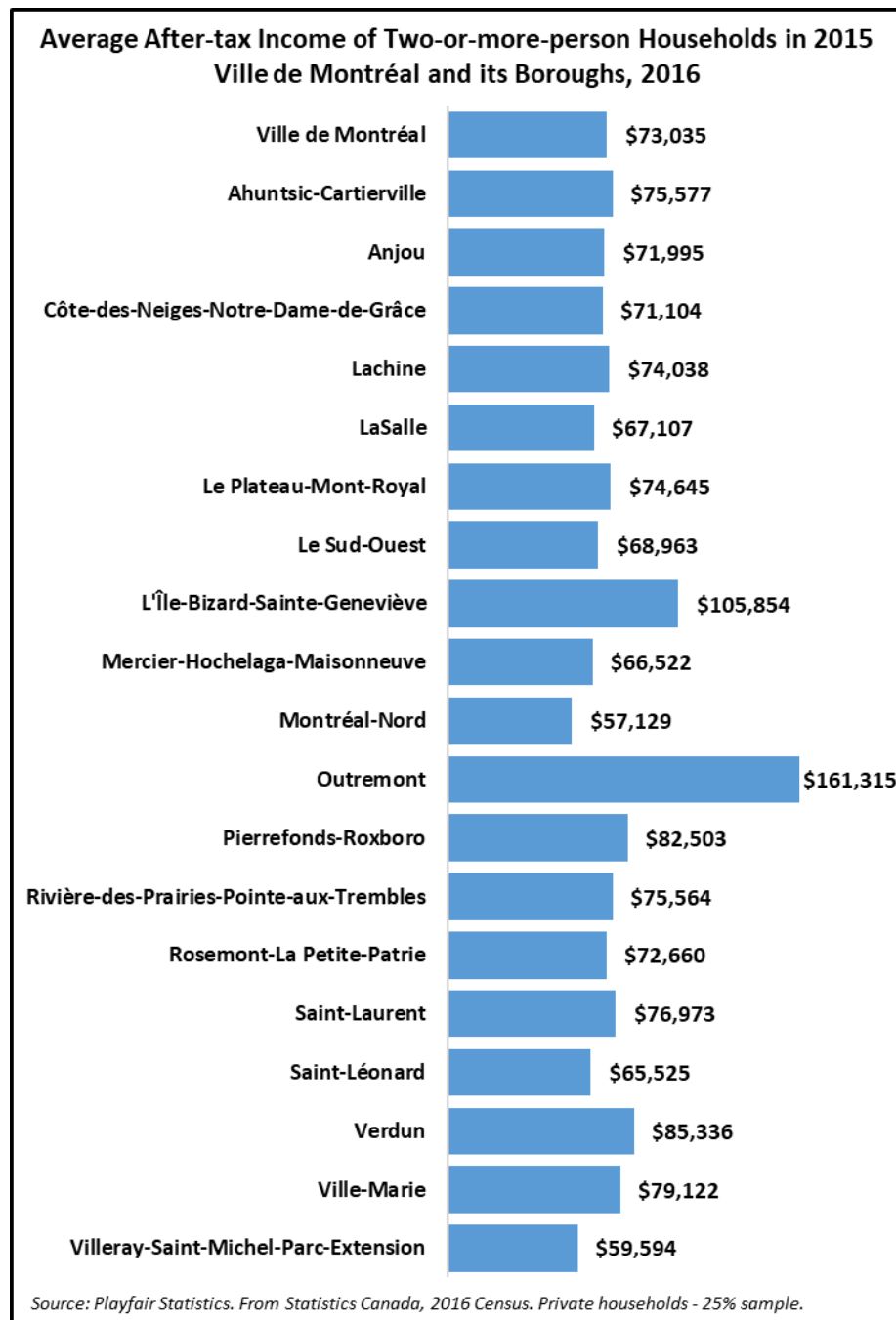
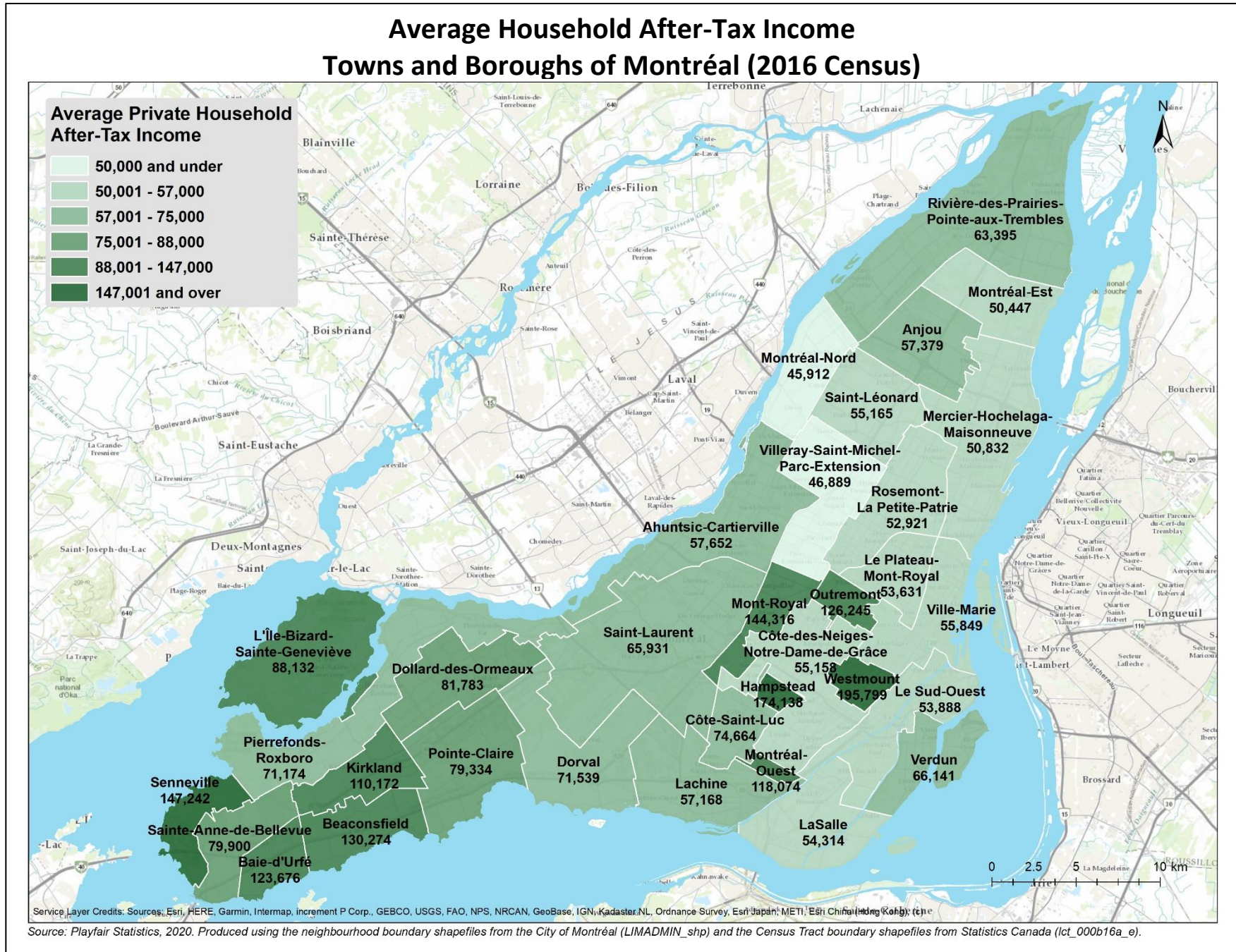


Figure 4.2.3 Average After-tax Income of Two-or-more-person Households in 2015



Map 7: Average Household After-Tax Income

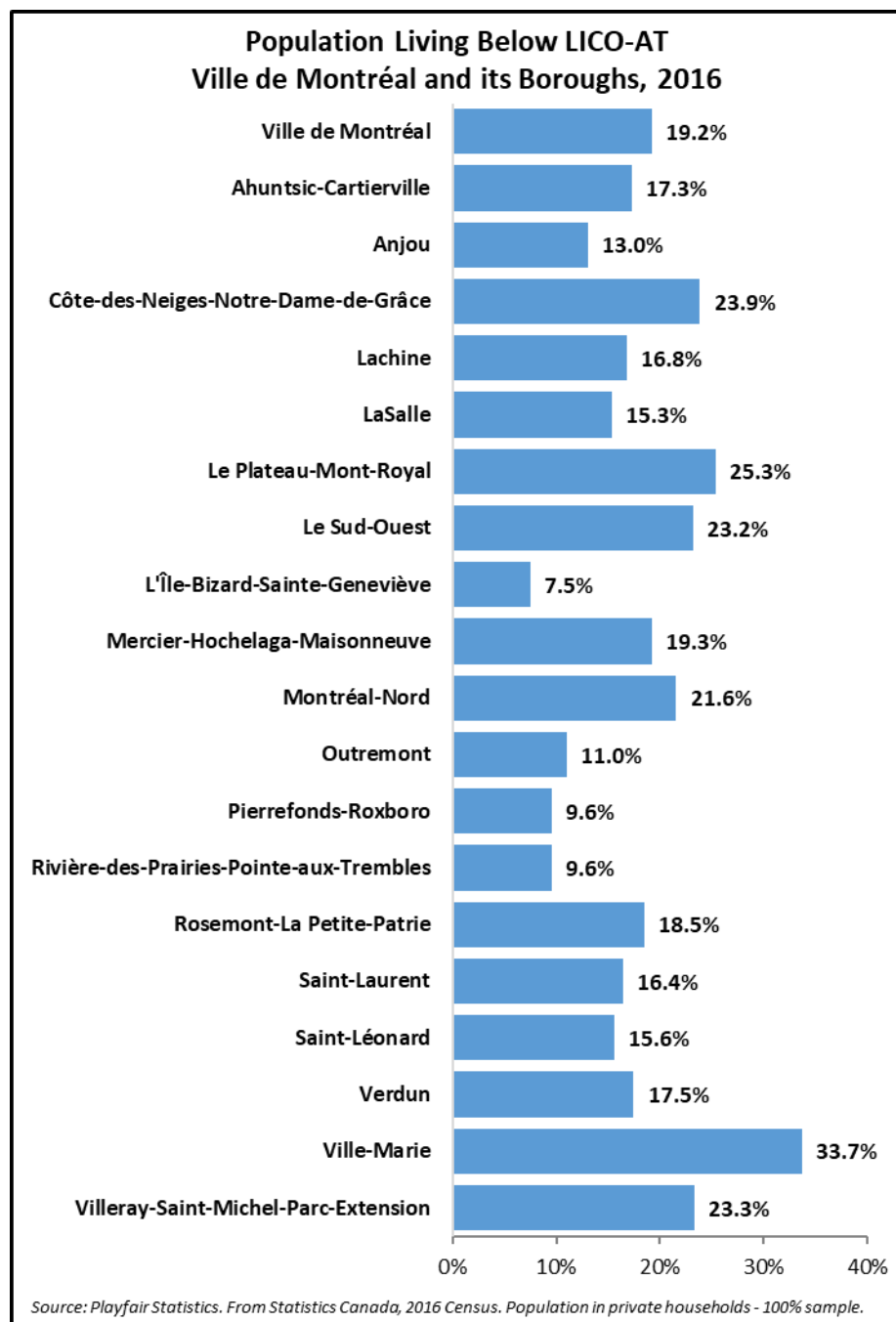

Note on the Low-income cut-off (LICO)

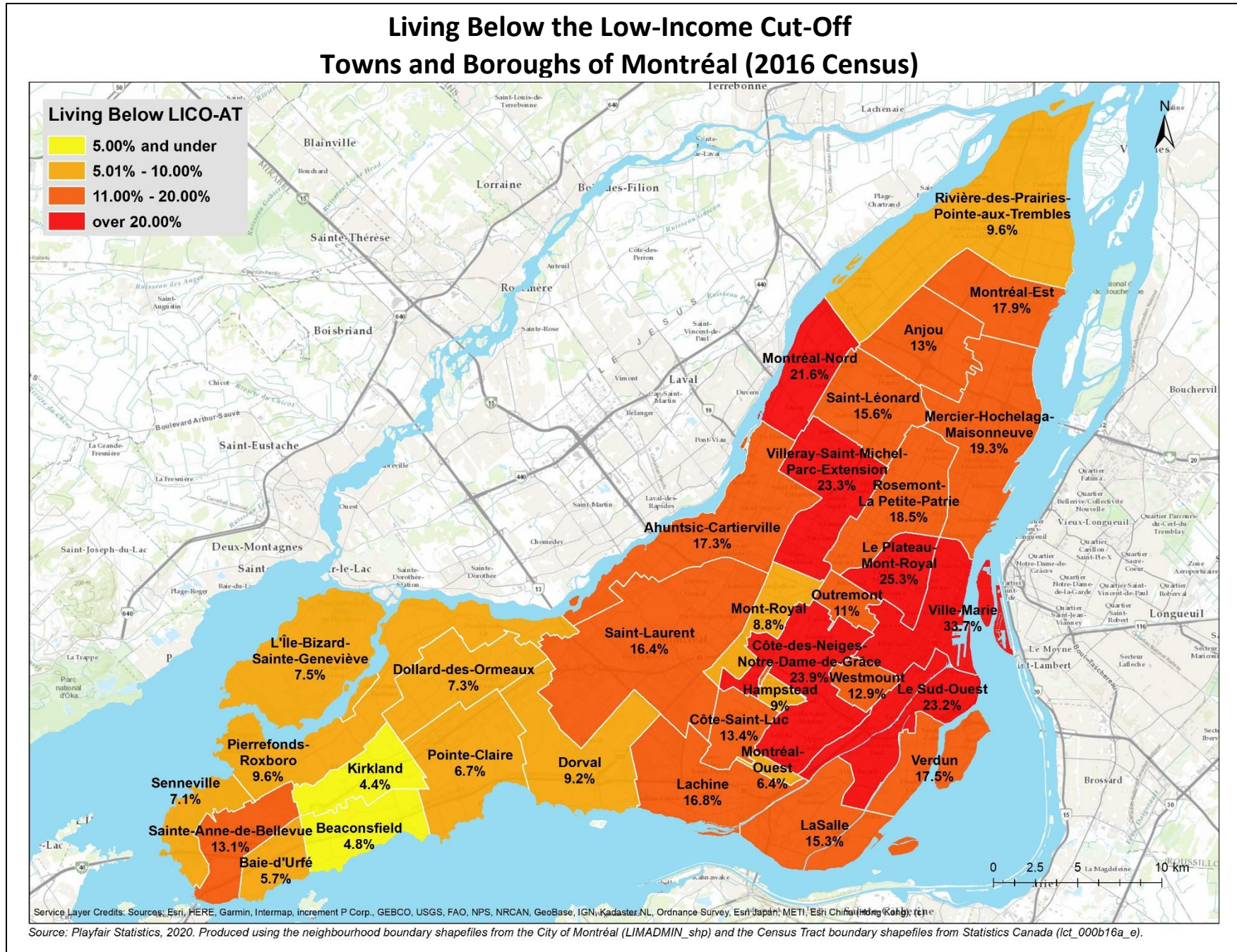
The Low-income cut-off thresholds represent income levels at which families or persons were expected to spend at least 20 percentage points more than average of their after-tax income on food, shelter, and clothing.

The LICO-AT has 35 cut-offs varying by seven family sizes and five different sizes of area of residence to account for economies of scale and potential differences in cost of living in communities of different sizes. These thresholds are presented in Table 4.3: Low-income cut-offs, after tax (LICO-AT — 1992 base) for economic families and persons not in economic families, 2015, Dictionary, Census of Population, 2016.

Since their initial publication, Statistics Canada has clearly and consistently emphasized that the low-income lines are not measures of poverty. Rather, low-income lines reflect a consistent and well-defined methodology that identifies those who are substantially worse off than average. These measures have enabled Statistics Canada to report important trends, such as the changing composition of those below the low-income lines over time.

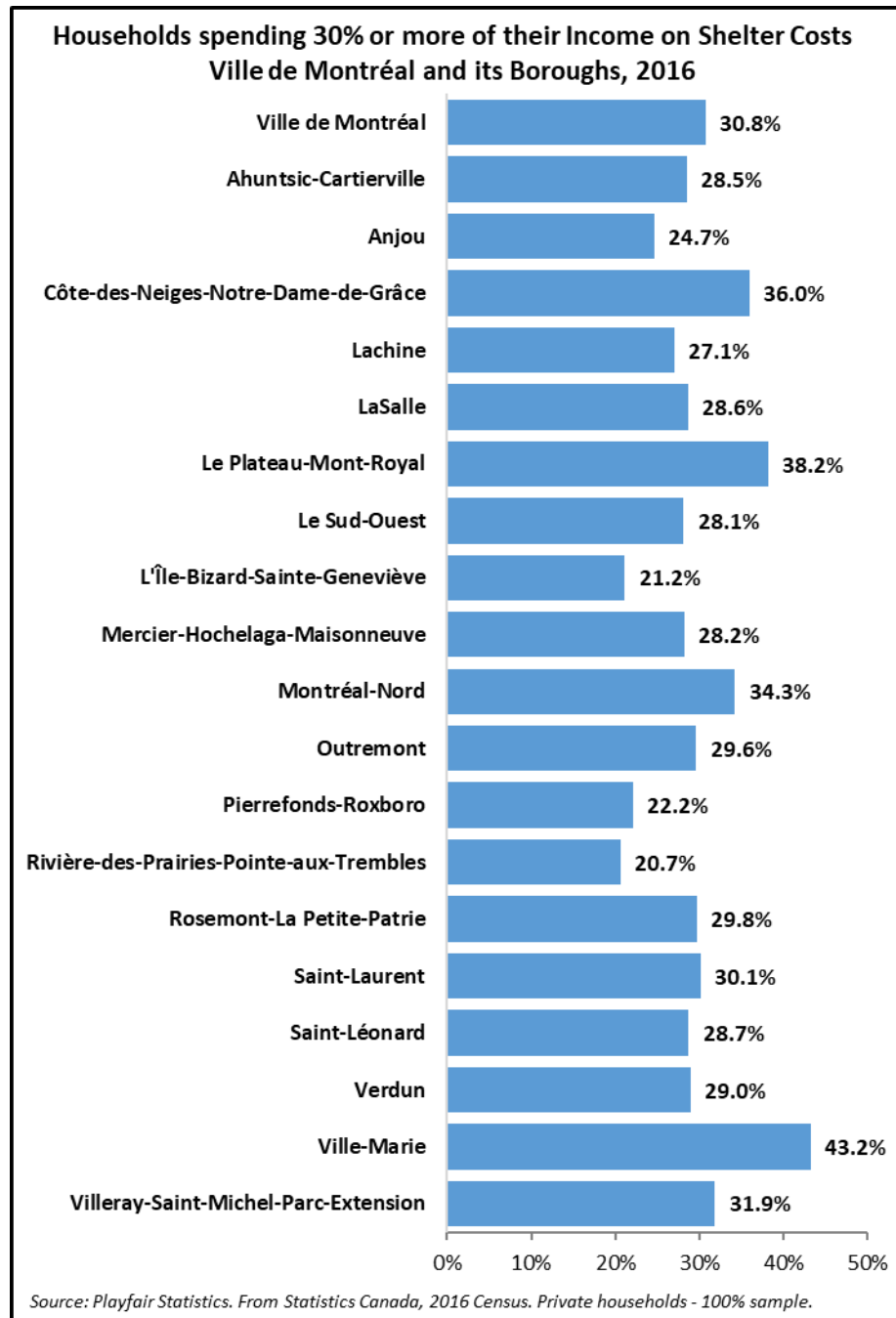

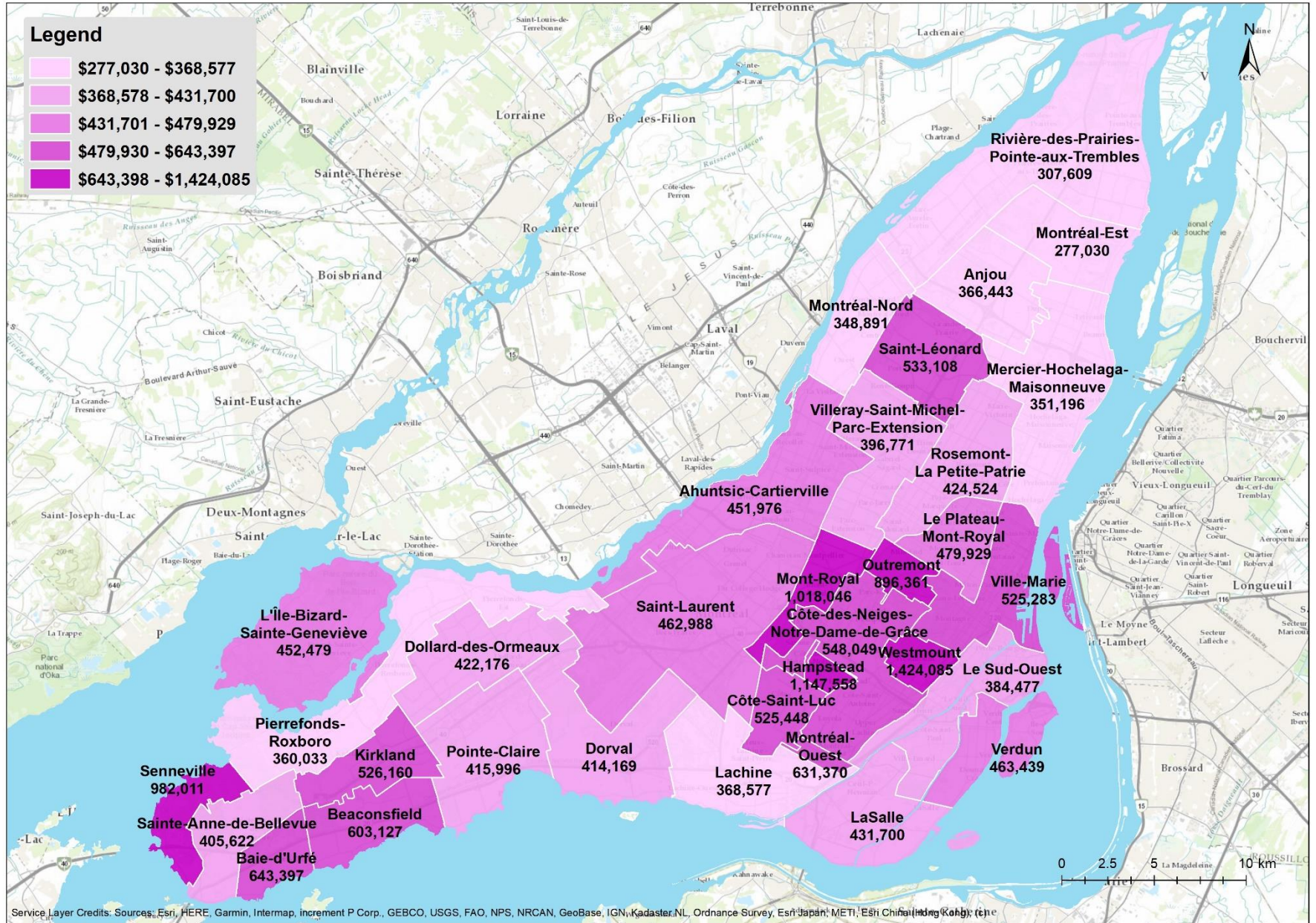

Figure 4.6.1 Average Monthly Cost of Owned Dwellings

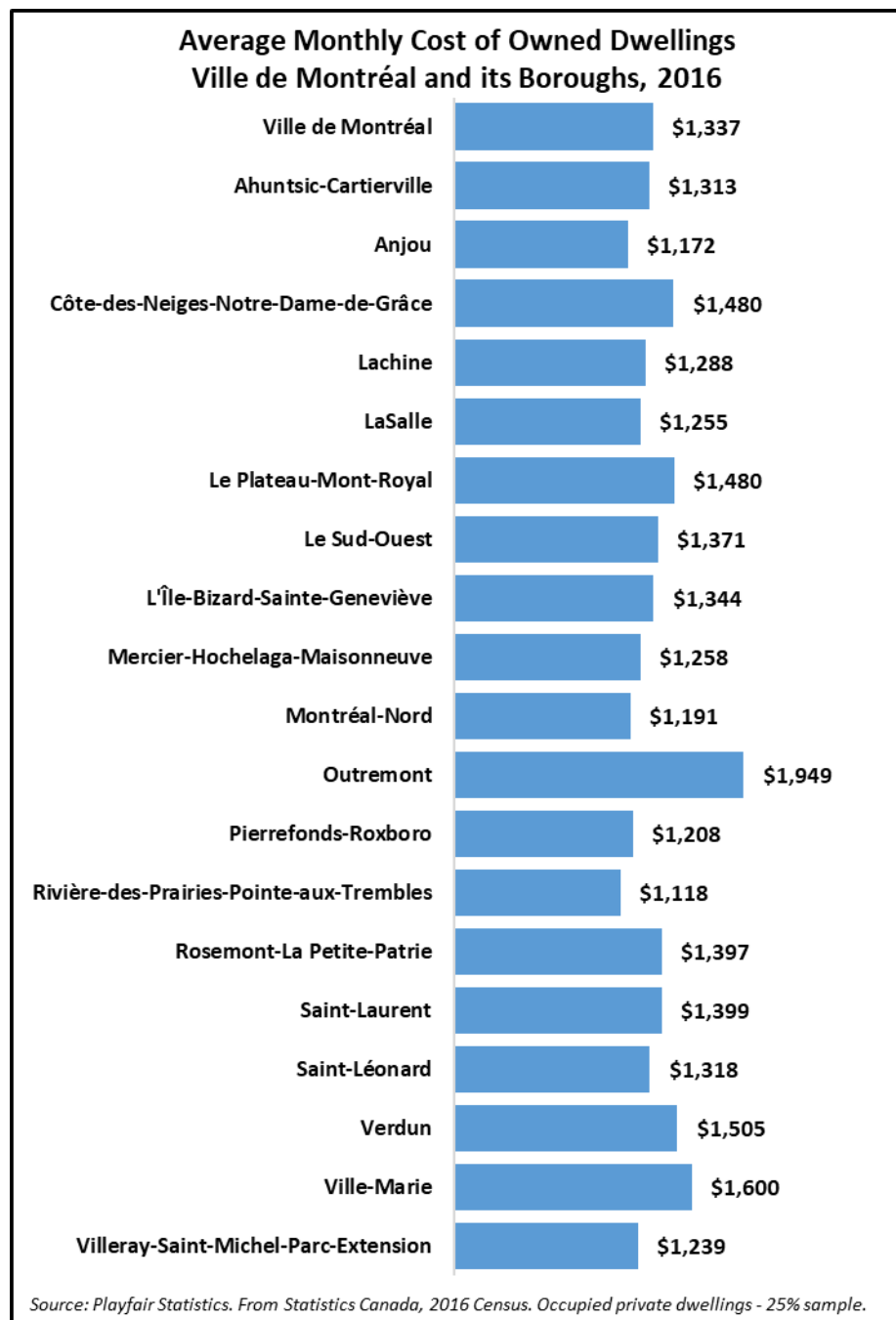


Figure 4.6.2 Average Monthly Cost of Rented Dwellings

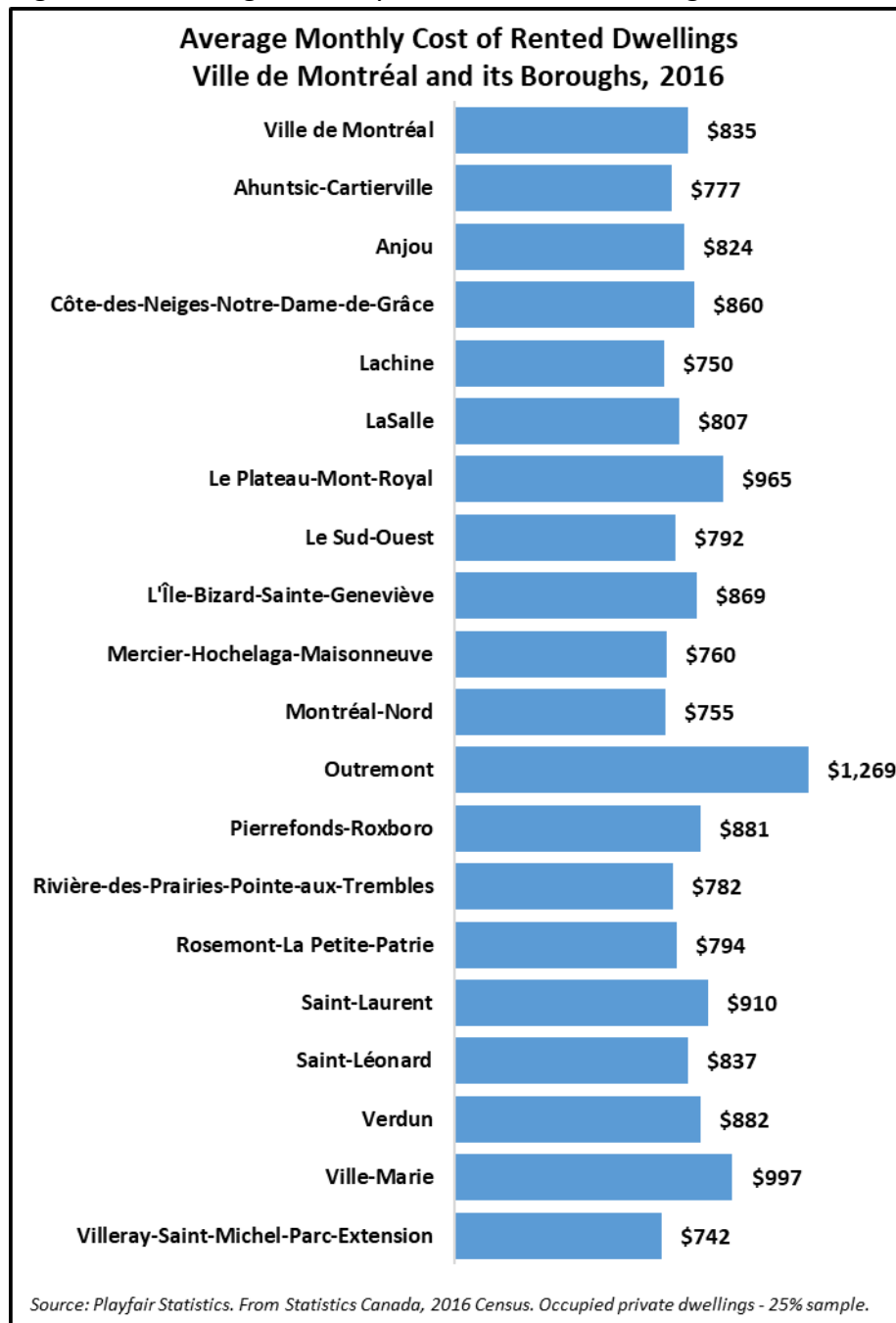
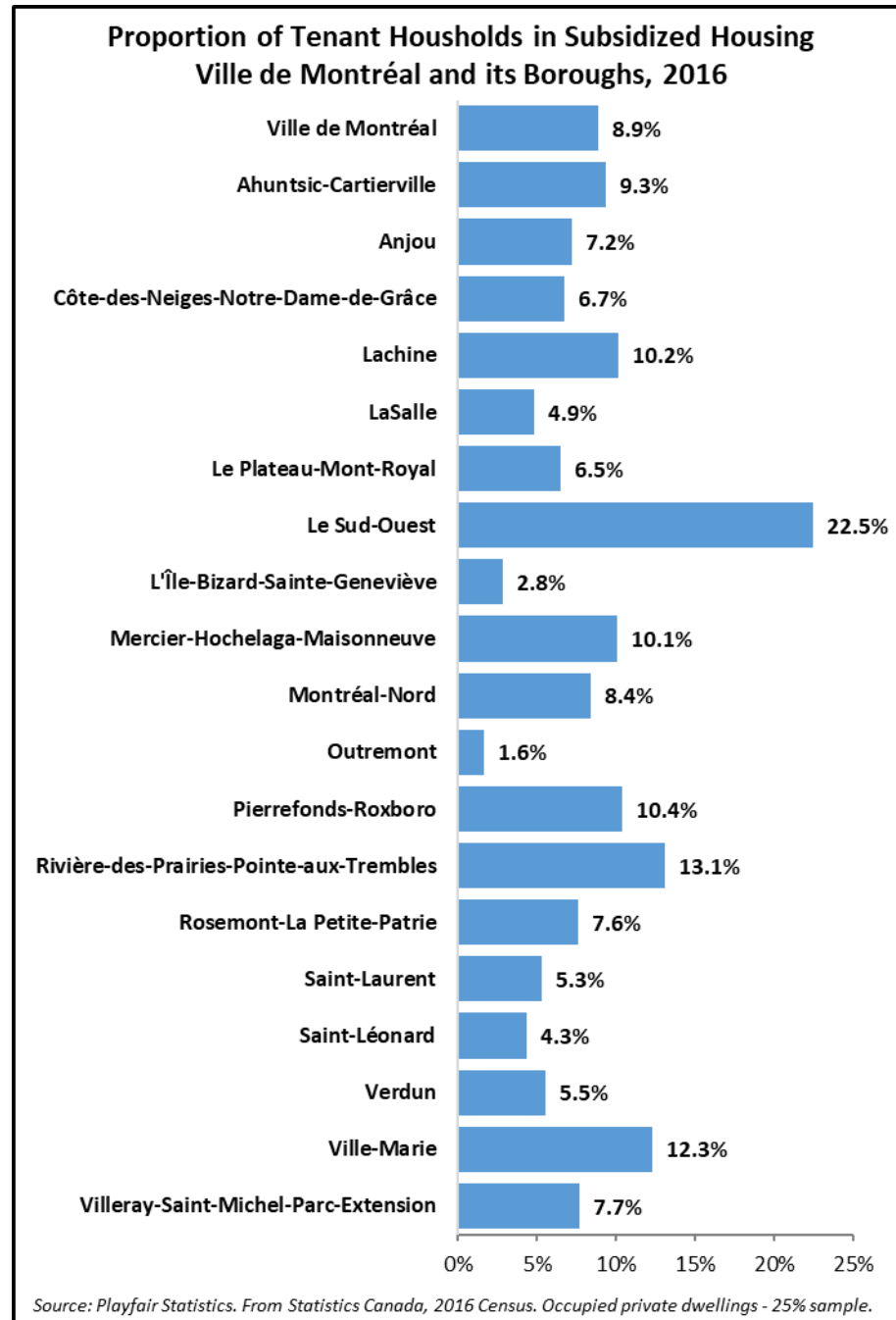
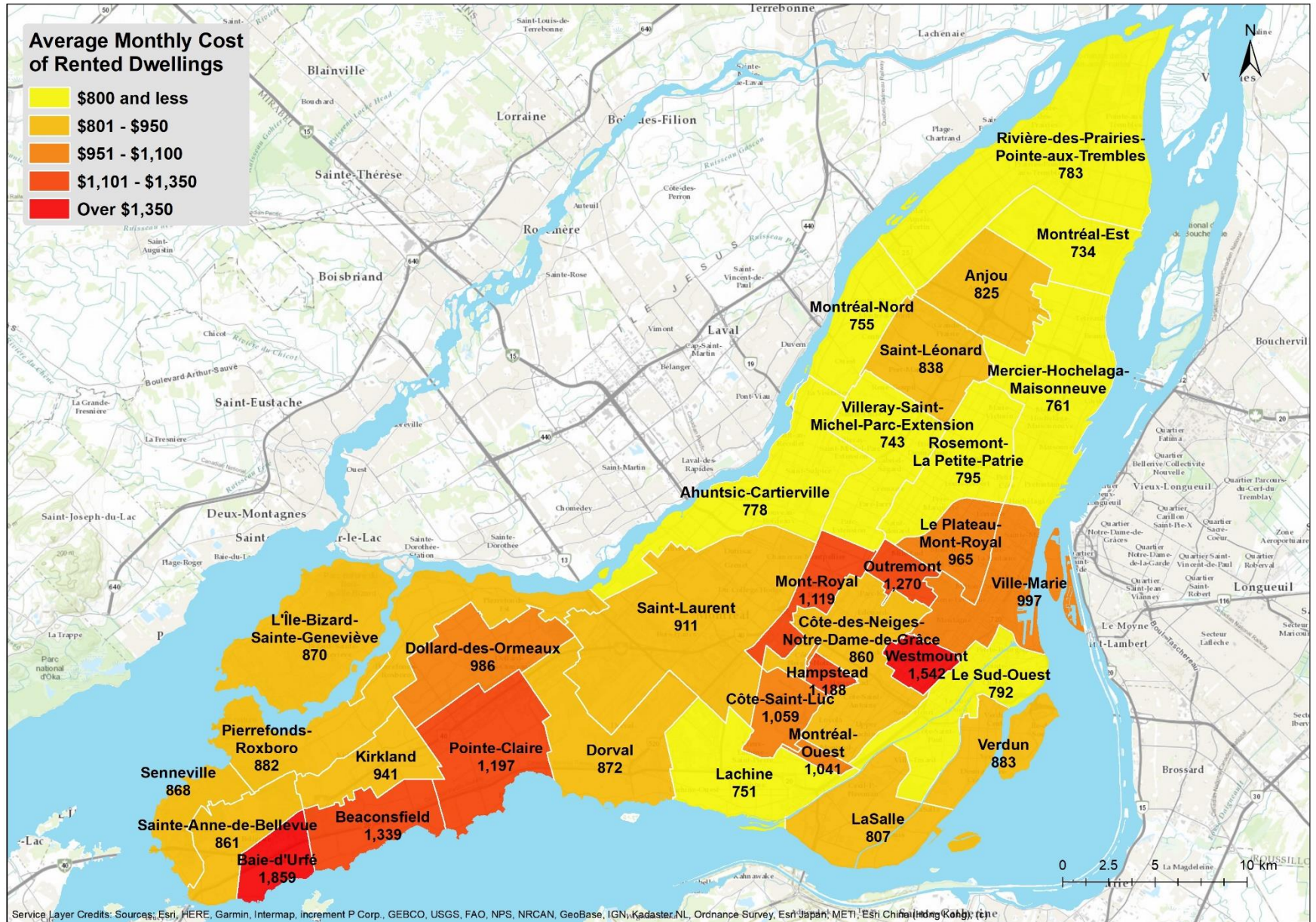


Figure 4.6.3 Proportion of Tenant Households in Subsidized Housing

Figure 4.7.1 Worked at Home

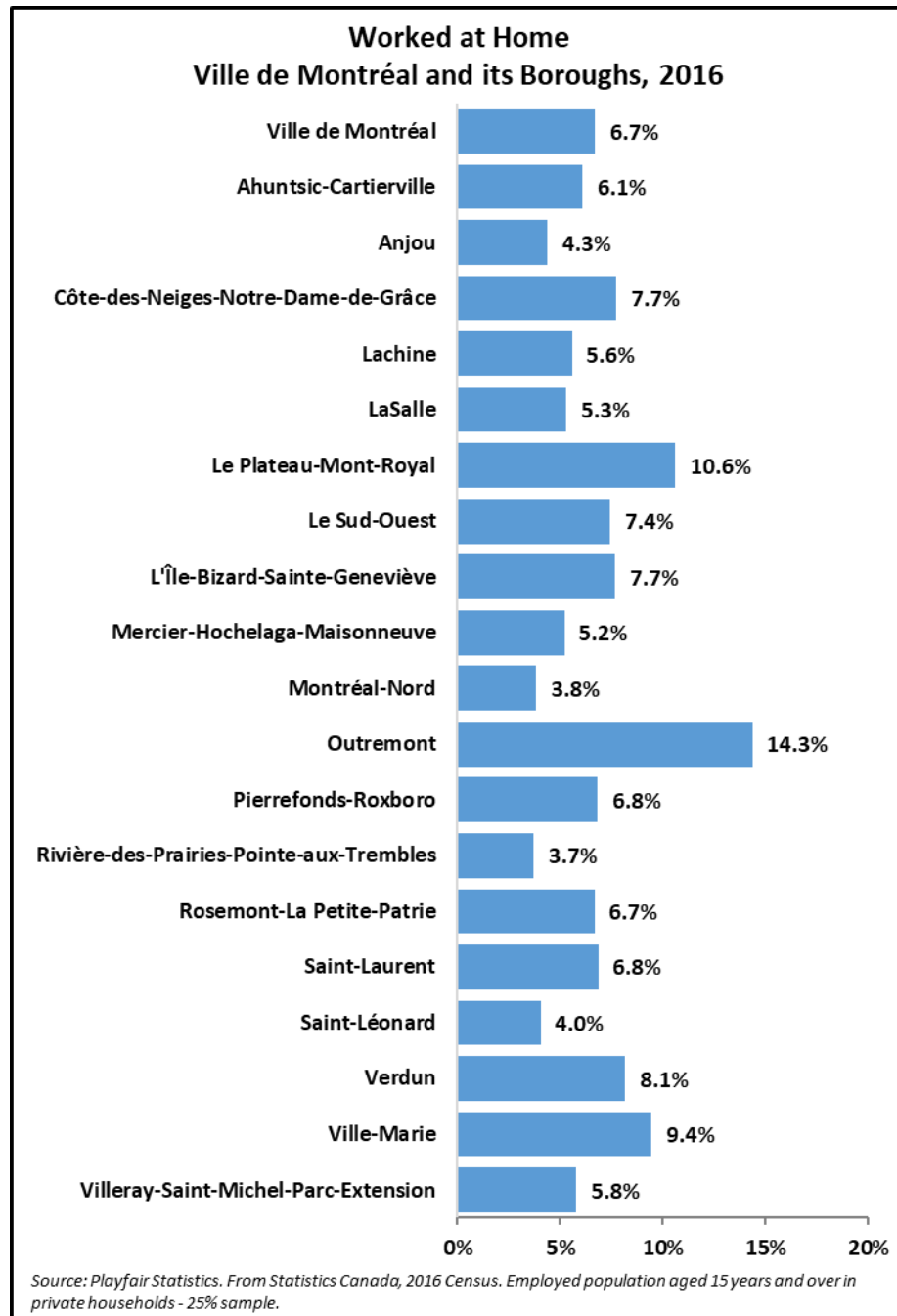
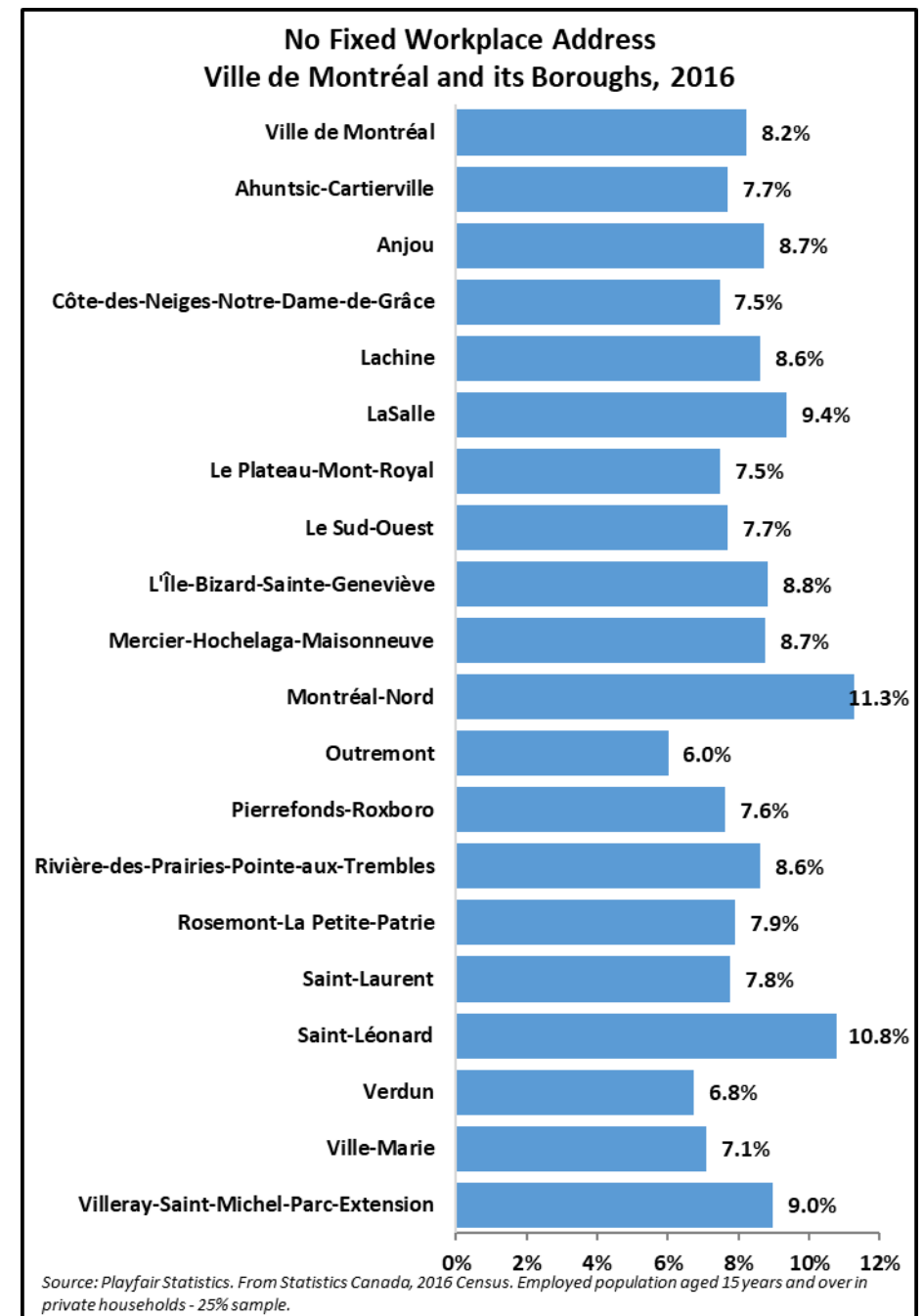


Figure 4.7.2 No Fixed Workplace Address

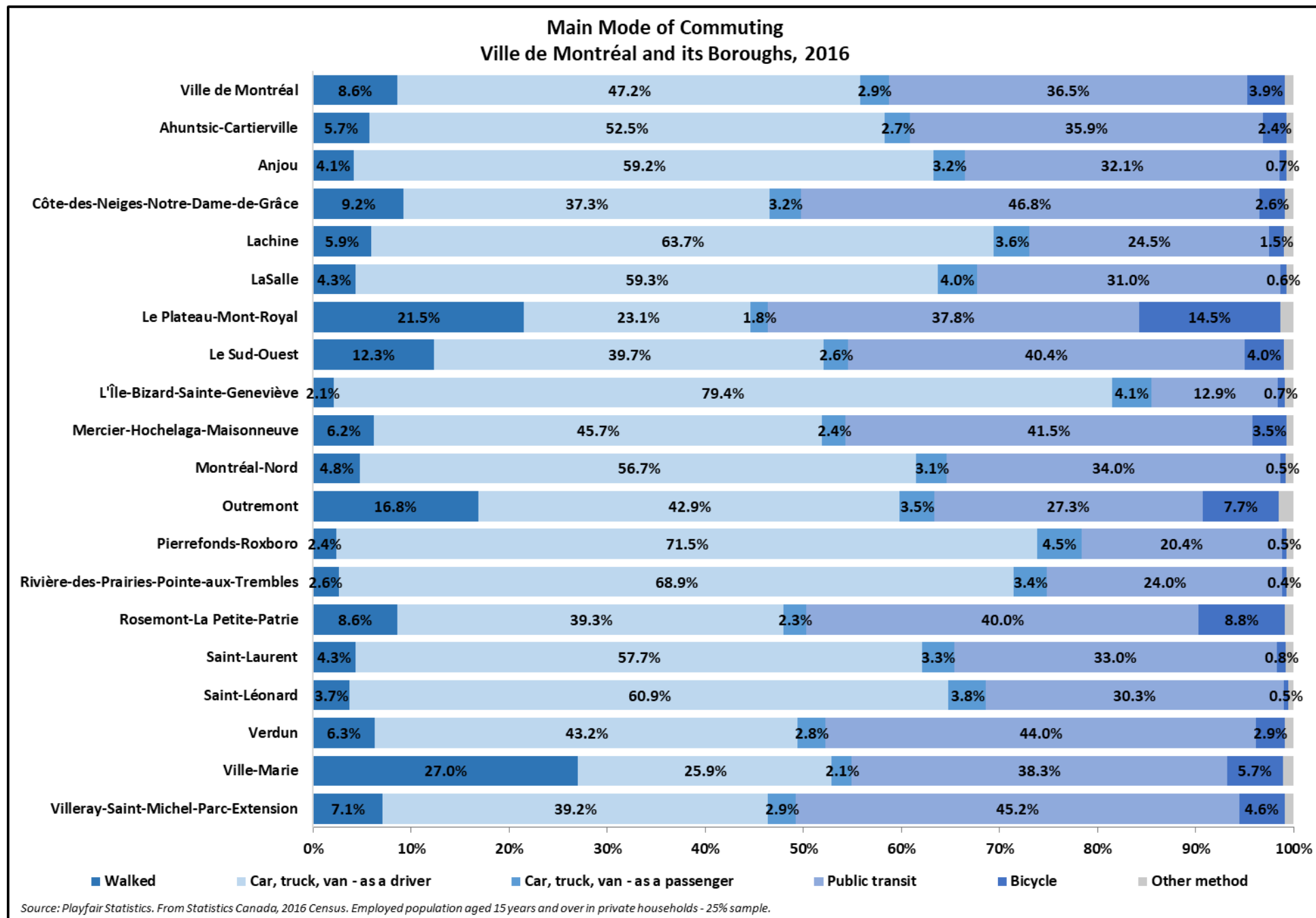

Figure 4.9.1 Main Mode of Commuting



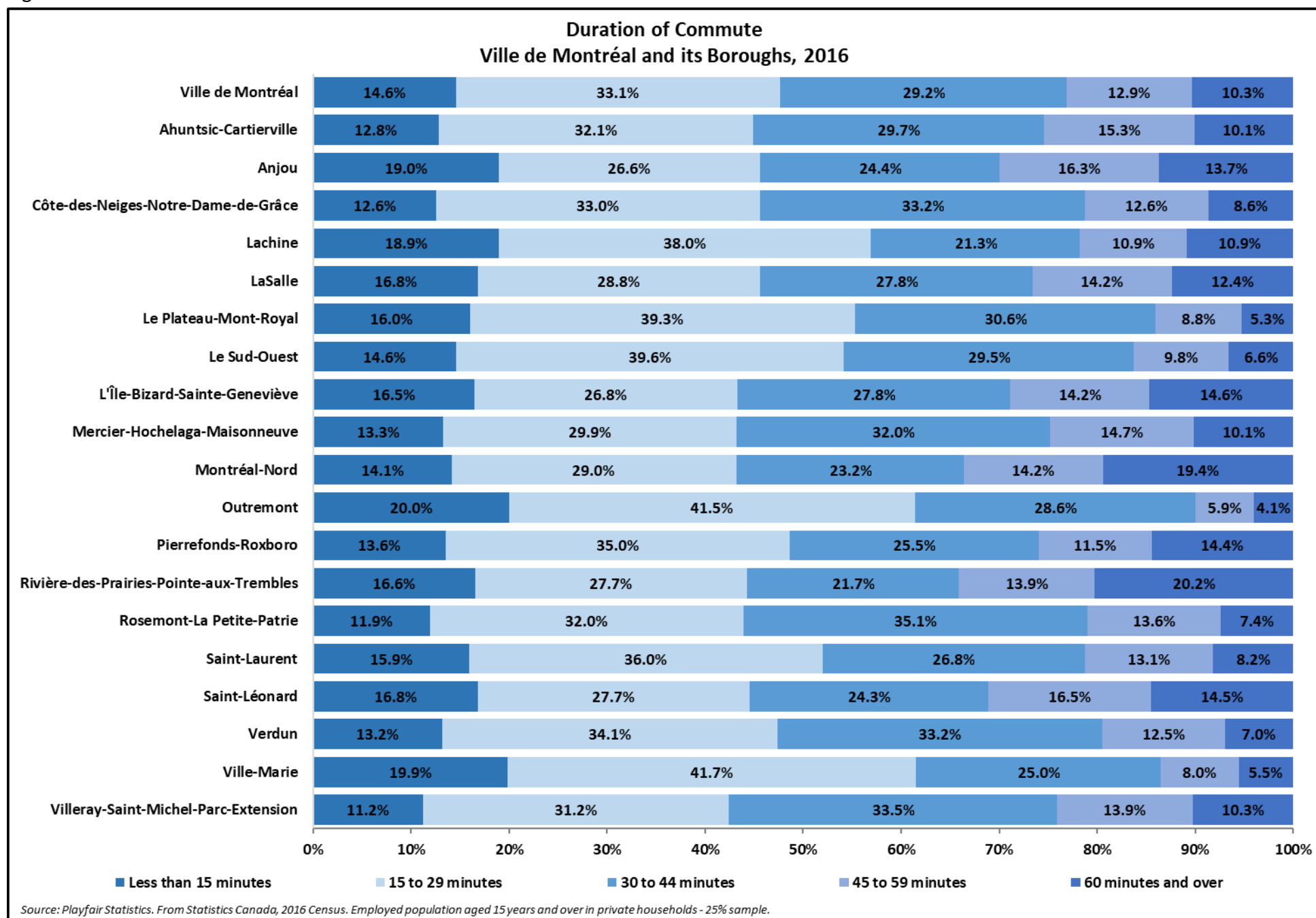

Glossary

A **census division**, as determined by Statistics Canada, is a "group of neighbouring municipalities joined together for the purposes of regional planning and managing common services (such as police or ambulance services). These groupings are established under laws in effect in certain provinces of Canada. For example, a census division might correspond to a county, one municipalit  regionale de comt  or a regional district. In other provinces and the territories where laws do not provide for such areas, Statistics Canada defines equivalent areas for statistical reporting purposes in cooperation with these provinces and territories."

A **census family** is defined by Statistics Canada as "a married couple and the children, if any, of either and/or both spouses; a couple living common law and the children, if any, of either and/or both partners; or a lone parent of any marital status with at least one child living in the same dwelling and that child or those children. All members of a particular census family live in the same dwelling. A couple may be of opposite or same sex. Children may be children by birth, marriage, common-law union or adoption regardless of their age or marital status as long as they live in the dwelling and do not have their own married spouse, common-law partner or child living in the dwelling. Grandchildren living with their grandparent(s) but with no parents present also constitute a census family."

A **census subdivision**, as determined by Statistics Canada, is "the general term for municipalities (as determined by provincial/territorial legislation) or areas treated as municipal equivalents for statistical purposes (e.g., Indian reserves, Indian settlements and unorganized territories)."

First Official Language Spoken is derived by Statistics Canada from the census questions on knowledge of official languages, mother tongue and home language. Multiple responses are distributed equally among declared languages.

The **generation status** of an individual is derived by Statistics Canada from responses to questions about the persons place of birth and the place of birth of their parents. As defined by Statistics Canada "'First generation' includes persons who were born outside Canada. For the most part, these are people who are now, or once were, immigrants to Canada. 'Second generation' includes persons who were born in Canada and had at least one parent born outside Canada. For the most part, these are the children of immigrants. 'Third generation or more' includes persons who were born in Canada with both parents born in Canada."

The term **immigrant** is defined by Statistics Canada as "a person who is, or who has ever been, a landed immigrant or permanent resident. Such a person has been granted the right to live in Canada permanently by immigration authorities. Immigrants who have obtained Canadian citizenship by naturalization are included in this group."

The **labour force** is calculated as the sum of the employed and the unemployed. The employed are persons with a job or a business. The unemployed are persons without a job who are able to work, willing to work and actively seeking work.

The **knowledge of languages** measure determines the languages spoken by each census respondent, counting official languages and non official languages. If a person speaks more than one language, they will be counted for each one of these languages.

Knowledge of official languages, as defined by Statistics Canada, "refers to whether the person can conduct a conversation in English only, French only, in both or in neither language. For a child who has not yet learned to speak, this includes languages that the child is learning to speak at home."

Low-Income Cut-Offs, After Tax (LICO-AT), as defined by Statistics Canada, refers "to income thresholds, defined using 1992 expenditure data, below which economic families or persons not in economic families would likely have devoted a larger share of their after-tax income than average to the necessities of food, shelter and clothing. More specifically, the thresholds represented income levels at which these families or persons were expected to spend 20 percentage points or more of their after-tax income than average on food, shelter and clothing. These thresholds have been adjusted to current dollars using the all-items Consumer Price Index (CPI). The LICO-AT has 35 cut-offs varying by seven family sizes and five different sizes of area of residence to account for economies of scale and potential differences in cost of living in communities of different sizes."

A **non-census family** is defined by Statistics Canada as "either one person living alone or a group of two or more persons who live together but do not constitute a census family."

Statistics Canada defines an **official-language minority** as "either a French-speaker or French-speaking population living outside of Quebec, where English is predominant, or an English-speaker or English-speaking population living in Quebec, where French is predominant."

Population density is a measure of the number of people living in a unit of space. In this document we calculate the population density per square kilometer by dividing the total population of our geography of interest by its land area in square kilometres.

A **private dwelling** is defined by Statistics Canada as "a separate set of living quarters with a private entrance either from outside the building or from a common hall, lobby, vestibule or stairway inside the building. The entrance to the dwelling must be one that can be used without passing through the living quarters of some other person or group of persons."

A **private household** is defined by Statistics Canada as "a person or group of persons who occupy the same dwelling and do not have a usual place of residence elsewhere in Canada or abroad. The household universe is divided into two sub-universes on the basis of whether the household is occupying a collective dwelling or a private dwelling. The latter is a private household."

Persons **reporting an Aboriginal identity** indicated that they identified with the Aboriginal peoples of Canada. Statistics Canada includes in this group "those who are First Nations (North American Indian), Métis or Inuk (Inuit) and/or those who are Registered or Treaty Indians (that is, registered under the Indian Act of Canada), and/or those who have membership in a First Nation or Indian band."

Statistics Canada calculates **shelter cost** as "the average monthly total of all shelter expenses paid by households that own or rent their dwelling. Shelter costs for owner households include, where applicable, mortgage payments, property taxes and condominium fees, along with the costs of electricity, heat, water and other municipal services. For renter households, shelter costs include, where applicable, the rent and the costs of electricity, heat, water and other municipal services."

Statistics Canada uses the **Housing Suitability** measure to determine "whether a private household is living in suitable accommodations according to the National Occupancy Standard (NOS); that is, whether the dwelling has enough bedrooms for the size and composition of the household. A household is deemed to be living in suitable accommodations if its dwelling has enough bedrooms, as calculated using the NOS. 'Housing suitability' assesses the required number of bedrooms for a household based on the age, sex, and relationships among household members."

The **unemployed** are persons without a job who are able to work, willing to work and actively seeking work. The unemployment rate is the proportion of persons in the labor force that are unemployed.

The Employment Equity Act defines **visible minorities** as "persons, other than Aboriginal peoples, who are non-Caucasian in race or non-white in colour". Statistics Canada determined that the "visible minority population consists mainly of the following groups: South Asian, Chinese, Black, Filipino, Latin American, Arab, Southeast Asian, West Asian, Korean and Japanese."

Methodology

This report was compiled using Census Tract data published by Statistics Canada for the 2016 Census Profile. The Census Tract shapefile from Statistics Canada was compared to Borough boundary files from the Ville de Montréal to build a correspondence file between the two geography types. Borough data was then aggregated from Census Tract data before calculating percentages. Properly weighted averages were derived by calculating the initial underlying sum before aggregating the numerator and denominator separately. Due to rounding on the part of Statistics Canada there may be a slight discrepancy between the given total for the Ville de Montréal and the totals or averages derived from Census Tracts or Boroughs.

The precise relationship between Montréal's Census Tracts and Boroughs is included below in the form of tables and maps. A more detailed and comprehensive version is included in the accompanying Data file for this document ([Housing and Population Characteristics Boroughs of Montreal Data.xlsx](#)).

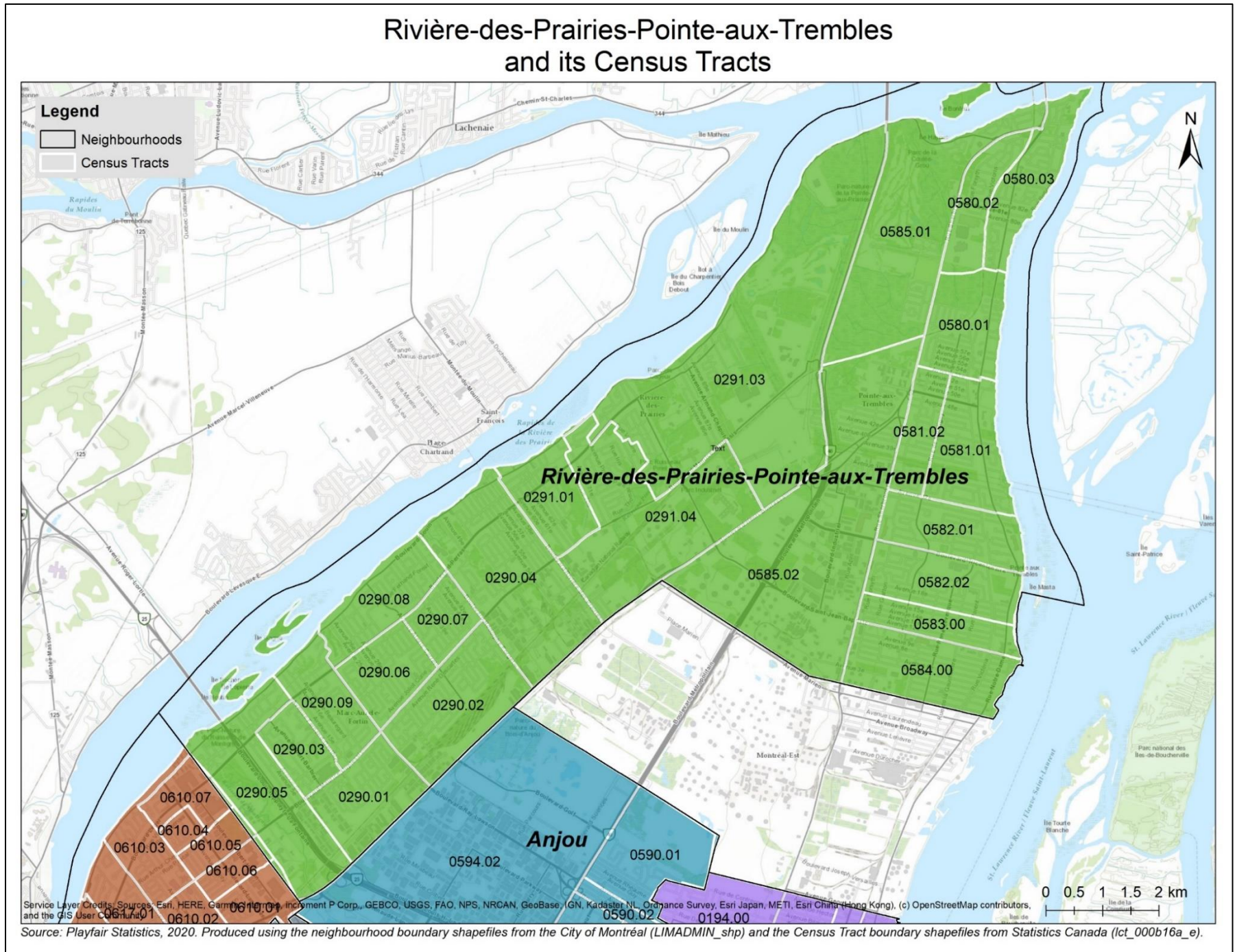

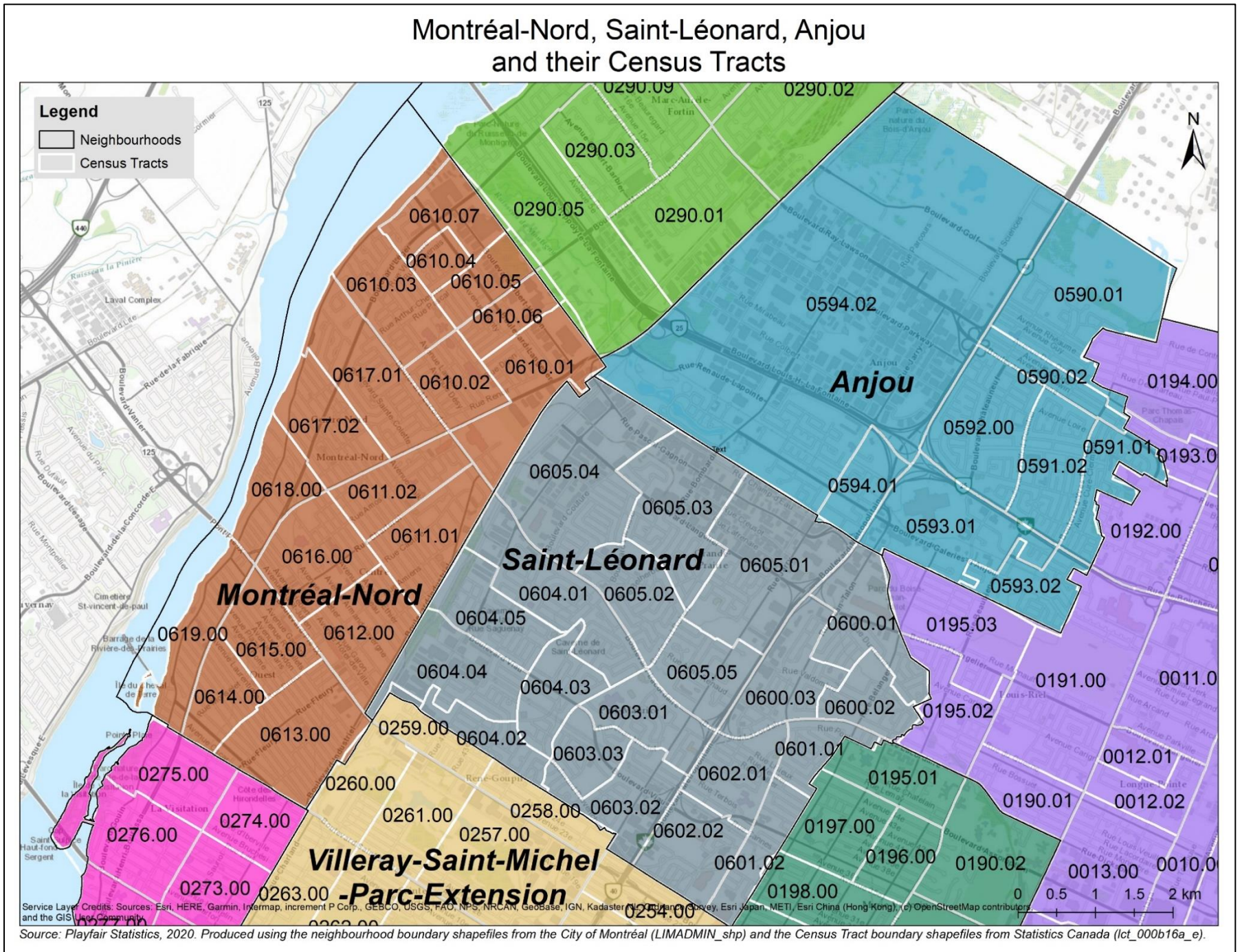

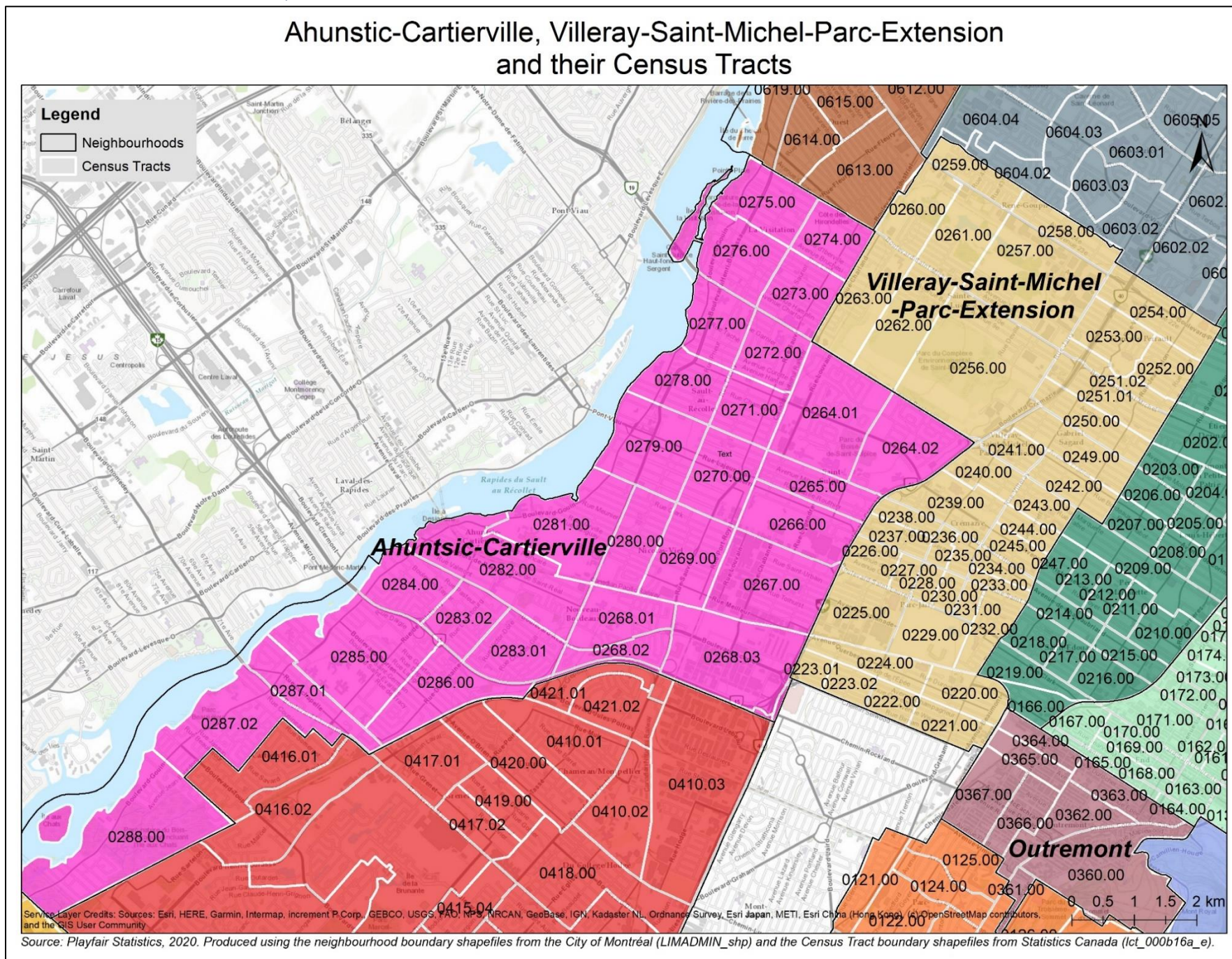
Map 12: Rivière-des-Prairies-Pointe-aux-Trembles and its Census Tracts



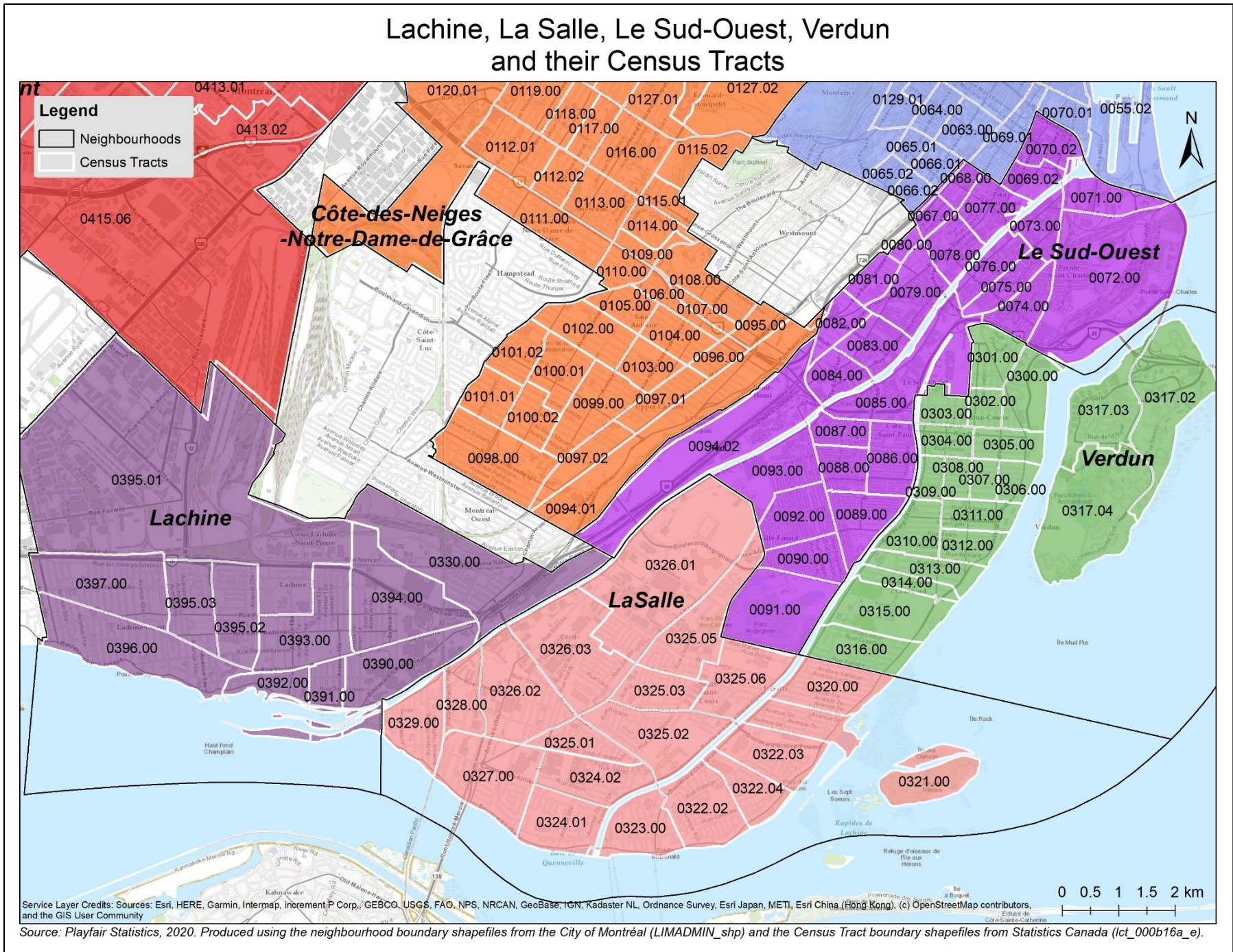
Map 13: Montréal-Nord, Saint-Léonard, Anjou and their Census Tracts



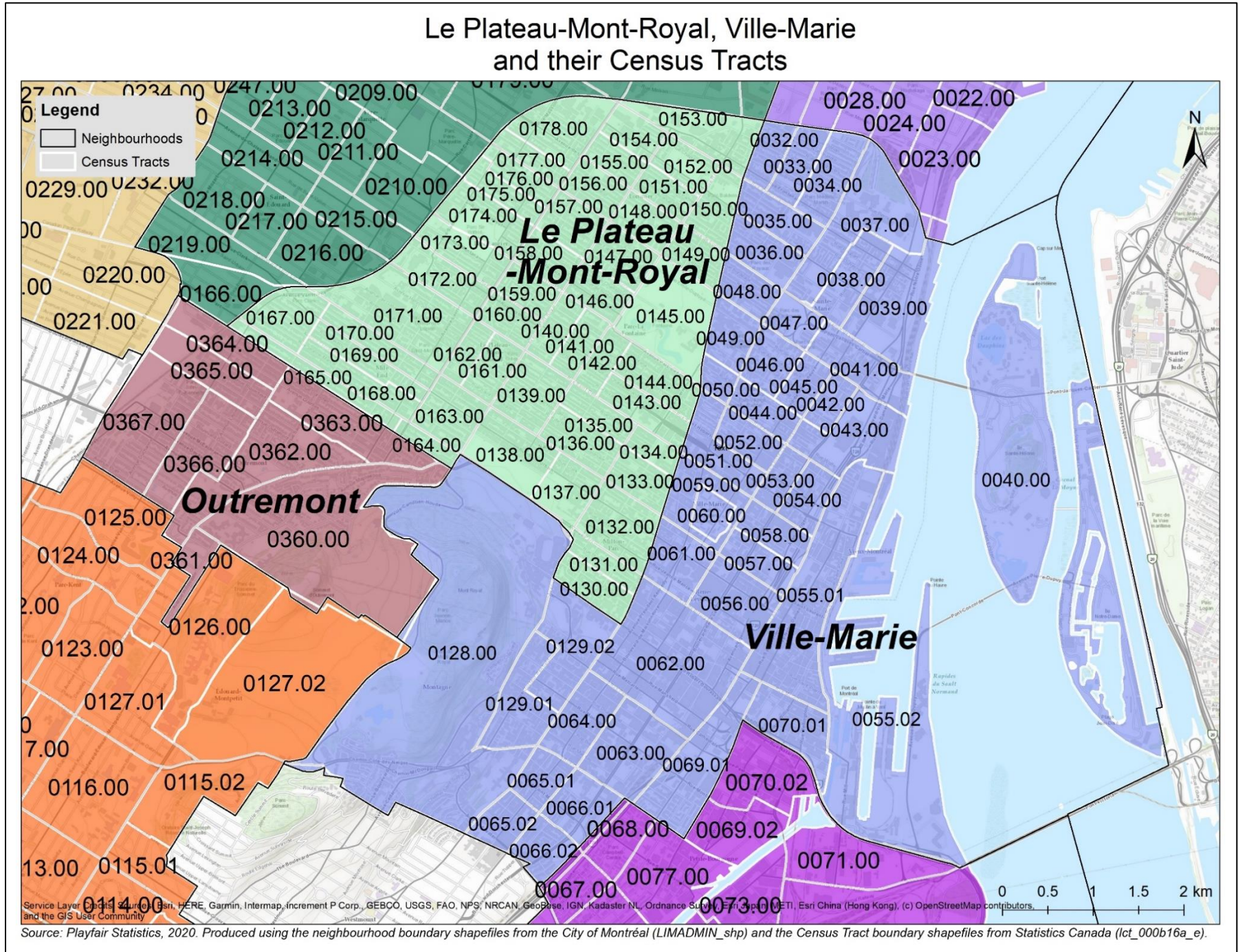
Map 15: Ahunistic-Cartierville, Villeray-Saint-Michel-Parc-Extension and their Census Tracts
